FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

Northern Round White Potatoes, nearly steady at shipping points, closing 60 to 70c sacked. Chicago carlots 80 to 90c. New York Round Whites 90 to \$1.10 Eastern consuming centers. Florida No. 1 Spaulding Rose up 25 to 50c per double head barrel New York at \$8.25 to \$8.50. Texas Sacked Bliss Potatoes \$4.25 to \$4.75 per 100 lbs. in Midwestern cities. New York Baldwin apples up 25 to 50c per bbl. in several Eastern wholesale markets. A 10c sold here, 20c to \$7 per bbl. sales reported in Boston as high as \$8; New York \$8.50. Northwestern extra fancy Winesaps, nearly steady. Chicago, medium to large sizes \$2.75 to \$3.25; small sizes \$2 to \$2.50. Sacked yellow onions, slow and dull in Western city wholesale markets at 75c to \$1 per 100 lbs. few sales from out of state. New York at \$1.75 to 2. Texas yellow Bermudas \$1.70 to 2 per standard crate No. 1 and 2 stock, commercial pack, in Eastern markets; \$1.25 to \$1.75 in Middlewestern center; shipping stations up 10 to 20c at \$1 carloads f. o. b. shipping point acceptance. Tennessee Klondike strawberries slightly weaker New York 25 to 50c quart basis; Virginia stock 28 to 30c. Klondikes in 24 quart crates \$4 per crate carloads f. o. b. cash track Arkansas points; Aransas \$6.50 to \$6.50. Klondikes \$5 to \$5.25 f. o. b. Tenn. stations.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: Butter markets showed tendency to become steadier the past week. Prices fluctuated slightly, but on the whole conditions pointed to more confidence in trading. No active movement into storage but some interest shown. Closing price 92 score: New York and Boston 36c; Chicago 31 1/2c; Philadelphia 37c. Cheese prices registered a further drop, followed by improvement in business. Prices ruling established new low records, being lower than at any time since 1915. On Plymouth Wisconsin cheese exchange for day the following prices prevailed: Twins 12 1/2c; Daisies 13c; Double Daisies 12 1/2c; Long Horns 12 1/2c; Young Americas 13c.

LIVESTOCK AND MEATS: Hog prices advanced 50c per 100 lbs. the past week. Beef steers and butcher cattle practically unchanged, feeder steers up 15c to 25c, fat lambs up 50 to 85c; feeding lambs steady; fat ewes up 25c to 50c. May 9 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales, \$8.45 to \$8.90; medium and good beef steers \$7.50 to \$8.75; butcher cows and heifers \$6 to \$8.75; feeder steers \$6.75 to \$8.25; light and medium weight veal calves \$7.75 to \$9.50; fat lambs \$9.50 to 11.85; feeding lambs \$7 to \$8.50; yearlings \$8.25 to \$9.50; fat ewes \$6 to \$7.50. Stockers and feeder shipments from 11 important markets during the week ending April 29 were: Cattle and calves 46,685; Hogs 7,096; sheep 11,095. Lamb and mutton advanced while beef, veal and fresh pork declined in Eastern wholesale fresh meat markets. Beef down 50c, veal \$2 pork loins ranged from steady to \$2 lower per 100 lbs. Mutton steady to \$1 higher; lambs up 1c to \$3. May 9 prices good grade meats: Beef \$15.50 to \$17; veal \$16 to \$18; lamb \$25 to \$28; mutton \$16 to \$18; light pork loins \$24 to \$25; heavy loins \$16 to \$19.

GRAIN: Prices advanced the early part of week due to strong wheat position and good export demand. This produced heavy liquidation cash wheat by growers and prices dropped on the 4th and 6th. Subsequent more favorable crop news from Oklahoma

and keen demand for wheat seaboard with good export sales reported caused strong reaction. On the 7th weakened technical position due big advance, reports exporters reselling and much needed rains reported Southeast brought about considerable change in sentiment and a precipitous decline resulted. On the 9th news mixed, and prices fluctuated rapidly. Export and milling demand slow. Visible supply wheat 12,423,000 bushels, a decrease of 1,025,000 for week. In Chicago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.43; No. 2 hard \$1.41; No. 3 mixed corn 55c; No. 3 yellow corn 60c; No. 3 white oats 33c. For the week Chicago May wheat up 4c to \$1.38 1/2; May corn half cent 59c. Chicago July wheat up 4 1/2c at \$1.15 3/4; July corn 1/2c at 62 1/2c. Minneapolis July wheat up 3 1/2c at \$1.19 3/4; Kansas City July 4 1/2c at \$1.06 1/2.

FEED: Decreased production has eased firmer tone in mill feed market but buyers reverse to buy at higher quotations. Linseed meal and corn feed dull and lower. Export demand and light stocks have caused advance in cotton seed meal prices. Spring bran quoted New York \$26, Philadelphia \$25, Chicago \$26, Minneapolis \$25; Spring middlings, New York \$15, Philadelphia \$23 1/2, Chicago \$18.25, Minneapolis \$14. Linseed meal Minneapolis \$29, Chicago \$31, Buffalo \$20.50, Kansas City \$21; cotton seed meal 36 per cent. Memphis \$27, Atlanta \$26.50, St. Louis \$31; gluten seed New York \$34.12, Buffalo \$30.93, Chicago \$26.50, best pulp, Philadelphia \$28.50, Cincinnati \$27.

WILL REMOVE WINKERS AT LAW

Governor Miller Says He Will Do So If Charges Are Made. Scorns Professed Helplessness

Albany, May 9.—The unpopularity of the State Prohibition laws, as expressed in replies of police chiefs of forty cities to a Mayors' conference questionnaire, has stirred up a tempest in Albany officialdom. The caustic remarks and their evident reluctance to pay any attention to the Mullan-Gage laws have angered Gov. Miller. He insists they can enforce the laws if they want to and hurled hot shot at their qualifications as police officials and good citizens generally.

The Governor will undoubtedly bring into action all the machinery at his command to oust any city officials who are lax or recalcitrant in driving bootleggers and saloonkeepers out of business. He said this afternoon he has the power to remove city officials on charges, and is apparently confident there will be no difficulty in having the charges made. It is believed he meant the Anti-Saloon Leaguers who are ever ready to swoop down on any unsuspecting official not keeping his domains sufficiently dry.

The Governor, when his attention was first called to the replies of the police chiefs, said he did not care to discuss the question. He was asked if he would comment on the statement of the Amsterdam police chief that to enforce the Prohibition Law required the changing of "100 per cent. Americanism into 100 per cent. scalpers."

"I will say this much," he said, "that the chief of police, if he made that observation, shows gross disregard of what Americanism means: that is, respect for and obedience of the laws; that he manifests unfitness to be a chief of police and that the Mayor of that city would do well to look into the subject of his qualifications."

BOY RUNS HOME

Lynn Brown, 4 Years Old, of Canaseraga, is Fatally Burned

Canaseraga, May 10.—Lynn, little four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Brown, was frightfully if not fatally burned on Monday afternoon. He was playing with other children when he started for home screaming.

His mother, who was calling at a neighbor's, heard him but supposed he had gotten into some trouble with his playmates. When he did not find his mother he ran to the home of J. Burdick not far from his own home, and they discovered that he was on fire. The flames were extinguished and he was taken home and a physician summoned, who found his little body painfully burned. His back, arms and side were burned in a sickening manner. He is too weak and prostrated to tell how the accident happened, but it is believed the children were playing with matches.

She Objected at Last. He had just gone into the grocery business and did nothing except talk "shop-shop" when he went to see his best girl. At first she endured it because she did not wish to offend him; later merely because she could find no way to reprove him.
