The Hon. Elba Reynolds, County, Judgé of Allegany County, died suddenly at his home in Belmont, Friday morning about 10 o'clock.

Judge Reynolds was apparently in usual health, arising in the morning and eating his breakfast at the usual time and about 10 o'clock it was discovered that he had quietly passed away while sitting in a chair visiting.

Elba Reynolds was born in the Town of Ward, June 20th, 1853. He passed his hoyhood days in that township, graduated from Alfred University, studied law in the office of Judge Hamilton Ward and has practiced law in Belmont since.

He has been identified in public life in this county for a number of years, serving as school commissioner for the Northern District of Allegany County, and in 1901 was elected County Judge and with continuous reslections was serving his fourth term. He would have retired under the age limit of 70 years in June 1923, before the completion of the present term.
