STUEBEN COUNTY GIVEN ARMY TRACTOR

The county of Steuben has received as a gift from the United States war department a 10-ton caterpillar tractor built for the government during the war and intended for the artillery service abroad.

The tractor is entirely new having been run about 25 miles when it was received Saturday afternoon. Its engine is encased in steel as also is the position which the driver takes. The tractor was built for foreign service.
