THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending May 23, 1921.)

HAY: Light receipts advanced timothy prices in several markets, but trading is light and movement is retarded by farm work. Alfalfa and prairie steady. Best grades in fair demand at unchanged prices. Number 1 timothy quoted New York \$23, Richmond \$26, Cincinnati \$22, Pittsburg \$22.50, Chicago \$22, No. 1 alfalfa \$24, No. 1 prairie \$20, St. Louis \$16, Omaha \$13, St. Louis \$20.

FEEDS: Feed market practically unchanged. No buying except for immediate needs. Local conditions caused some slight price changes. Spring bran quoted New York \$26, Philadelphia \$24.50, Chicago \$19, Minneapolis \$15.50. 35 per cent cottonseed meal—Atlanta \$30, Memphis \$25.50, Chicago \$22.50, Lincoln \$20, New York \$30, Chicago \$30, No. 1 alfalfa meal—Omaha \$20, Kansas City \$18, Gluten feed—Philadelphia \$23.21, Cincinnati \$29.30, Chicago \$26, best pulp; New York \$29.50, Pittsburg \$25.70.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: A firmer feeling existed in butter markets at close of week and prices advanced 1/4 to 1/2, 92 score bringing 28 1/4; New York; 27 1/4 Chicago. At these prices

there is a more settled feeling and buyers are storing best lots more freely. Cheese market has been very active with firmer feeling at close. Dealers generally desire to keep stocks moving in anticipation of greatly increased make as full grass comes on and cheese improves in quality and storing season begins. Prices range mostly 13 1/4 to 14 1/2 c in Wisconsin; 14 to 15 c in Eastern markets.

GRAIN: Unfavorable crop reports confirmed by four local crop experts together with good export business resulted in upward trend of prices during the week. Cash wheat in fair demand until the 21st when bulge brought out wheat from country and premiums over May largely disappeared. On the 23rd wheat sold at New high point and May within 5c of extreme prices for season; advances subsequently lost on speculations rain in Southwest and covering by commission houses. Passage emergency tariff bill in senate also regarded as bearish factor. Visible wheat supply 9,565,000 bushels—a decrease of 1,685,000 bushels for week. Visible corn supply 15,224,000 bushels—a decrease of 2,521,000 bushels for week. In Chicago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.70; No. 2 hard \$1.68; No. 3 mixed corn 56c; No. 3 yellow 57c; No. 4 white oats 32c. For week Chicago May wheat up 2 1/2 c at \$1.67 1/2; May corn down 1 c at 58 1/2 c. Chicago July wheat up 12 1/2 c at \$1.28; July corn unchanged at 61 1/2 c. Minneapolis July wheat up 1 1/4 c at \$1.32 1/2; Kansas City July up 12 1/4 c at \$1.21; Winnipeg July up 16 1/4 c at \$1.66.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES: Northern sacked Round White potatoes slightly weaker at shipping points, closing 80 to 85c. Chicago

carlot market also slightly weaker at 90c to \$1. South Carolina No. 1 Irish Cobbler up 28c per bbl. New York, selling to jobbers at \$7.25 to \$7.50 per cloth top flat barrel. Texas sacked Bliss Triumph down \$1 to \$1.50 per 100 lbs., St. Louis and Kansas City at \$2.50 to \$3.50. Production of early potatoes forecast by Bureau of Crop Estimates at 27,028 cars compared with 22,104 cars last season. Condition reported improving since forecast. New York cold storage A 2 1/2 Baldwin apples down 50c per bbl. to \$6.50; closing \$6.50 to \$7; Philadelphia \$6.75; fair condition stock \$5.50 to \$6 New York. Medium size Extra Fancy North-western Wisconsin steady Chicago at \$3. to \$3.50; small sizes \$2.25 to 2.75. Texas yellow Bermuda onions slightly lower in consuming markets at \$1.25 to \$1.90 per standard crates commercial pack. Commercial onion acreage as reported to Bureau of Crop Estimates to be planted indicates 27,067 acres compared with 31,802 acres harvested last year. Greatest decrease expected in New York, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. Maryland and Virginia Klondike strawberries steady at 22 to 26c per quart. New York. Tennessee Aropas slightly lower Chicago at \$6.25 to \$8.50 per 24 quart crate. Florida watermelons average weight 22 to 24 lbs., selling to Boston jobbers 75 to 85c each. Southern Florida has suffered 50 to 70 per cent yield reduction account of drought. Crop in Central and Northern Florida will be materially increased account 4 to 6 inch rain.

LIVESTOCK AND MEATS: The past week livestock and meat Chicago hog prices gained 5c to 25c per 100 lbs. Beef steers generally 25c lower butcher cows and heifers down 25 to 50c. Feeder steers generally steady. Veal calves down 25c. Fat lambs lost 50c; fat ewes \$1.50 to \$2. Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales \$8.40 to \$8.80; beef steers \$7.25 to \$8.75; butcher cows and heifers \$5 to \$6.75; light and medium weight veal calves \$7.25 to \$9.75; fat lambs \$8.75 to \$11.50; fat ewes \$4 to \$6 if eastern wholesale fresh meat markets. Lamb was again the only meat to advance, prices ranging \$1 to \$2 higher than a week ago per 100 lbs. Beef lost 50c to \$1; veal and mutton \$1 to \$2. Pork loins generally \$1. May 23 prices good grade meats: Beef \$14 to \$16; veal \$14 to \$17; lamb \$26 to \$27; mutton \$13 to \$17; light pork loins \$22 to \$24; heavy loins \$16 to \$19.

ARMED MEN RIFLE TRAIN
Twenty armed and masked men held up a freight train on the Sanborn branch of the New York Central near North Tonawanda the morning of May 21st and carried away merchandise estimated to be worth \$70,000. The train was held a half hour, half the bandits covering the crew and the railroad detectives who were on the train as guards, while the others loaded the goods into six motor trucks. The bandits headed for Buffalo with the loot. Seventeen cars were opened. The leader directed operations from the top of a car in the center of the train.

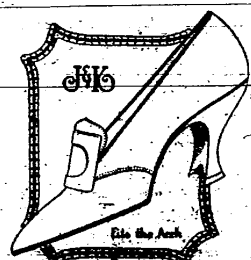
