MUCH-NEEDED RAINS

AID GRASS AND GRAIN

Much-needed showers were general last week, causing marked improvement in grass and grain, according to the weather and crop report for the week ending May 31, sent out from the Ithaca office of the weather bureau. Temperature was about normal, altho low at the first of the week and weather conditions favored the growth of all crops.

Cultivation of corn and potatoes has begun in many sections, however, planting is not yet completed. Farm work was hindered somewhat by showers, but is still in advance of the average.

The condition of grain is excellent; some pastures are short; meadows are reported generally very good, except new seeding which shows considerable winter killing. Alfalfa is about ready for the first cutting; truck is doing well, and homegrown strawberries are now on the market.

Or is it a cold-blooded effort to purchase the brotherly-love that we all know does not exist?

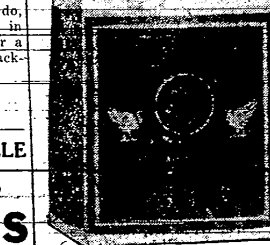
Or what is it?

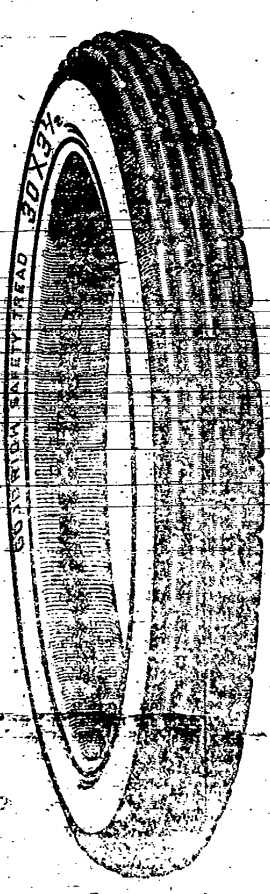
