Of Interest to Farmers

DEAN MANN DECLINES TO BE COMMISSIONER

Appreciates Honor and Opportunity For Service in Albany But Feels First Duty is to College.

Dean Albert R. Mann of the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University has declined the position of commissioner of farms and markets to which he had been elected by the council of farms and markets.

On his return from a recent trip to the West, Dean Mann found awaiting him the official notification of his election. He wrote to William E. Dana, president of the council, a letter stating his inability to accept the appointment and expressing appreciation of the honor conferred by his election. He also said that the position at Albany gave a great opportunity for service to the state but that he felt that his first duty lies with the college of agriculture of which he is the head.

In making known his declination of the appointment he made the following statement:

"I am sensible of the opportunities and privileges which the commissioner of farms and markets affords, and I am grateful to the members of the council of farms and markets who felt that I might be able, in some degree at least, to discharge the responsibilities. I am, however, not available for the appointment. I know that I should not leave my present work, in which the opportunity for useful public service is wide. In view of the action of the council, which I deeply appreciate, I regret that I cannot accept.

Opportunities Realized

"In making this decision I do not minimize the great importance or attractiveness of the headship of the combined departments of farms and markets in this state. Under the law as revised by the last legislature, creating a single-headed department with assurance of relative permanence of tenure of office, and placing in the hands of the commissioner real authority for the administration of the department with freedom to make such changes in the organization as he may deem wise and necessary, the office of commissioner offers opportunity for service of a high order.

As official head of the state's service for agriculture, the commissioner is not limited in his work to the highly important task of properly administering the agricultural law, but he has also exceptional opportunity to promote the agricultural development of the state, to help shape the agricultural policies, and to influence in important ways the agricultural institutions. It is in his power to make his department of great use both to farmers and to our vast city populations, and not unaware of these attractions, which, however, I must leave for another."

EVENING SESSIONS ARE FIELD DAYS FEATURES

After Strenuous Inspection of College Farms, Entertainment in Bailey Hall Should Appeal

The evening sessions in Bailey Hall will prove among the most popular events of Farmers Field Days at Cornell this summer, if predictions being made at the college are fulfilled. The dates of the field days are Thursday, Friday, Saturday, June 23, 24, 25.

While the field days, as their name indicates, are primarily for the purpose of giving the people of the state an opportunity of seeing the farms and fields and campus at their best, "with their working clothes on," as someone has put it, it is that by evening the guests will be ready to sit down and enjoy the indoor entertainments. These will be given in Bailey Hall, the college auditorium, which is capable of seating upwards of 2500 people.

One evening there will be a miscellaneous program which will demonstrate, in a way, community recreation in several of its phases, especially community singing.

Musical Program Arranged
The other evening it is expected that a musical and dramatic program will be offered by faculty and students of Ithaca Conservatory of Music.

It is not intended to have any speech making at these evening programs, as their purpose is solely recreational and social.

Last year was the first time the field days were held. The way the people of the state responded to the college's invitation to come to Ithaca and see how the college farms and experiments are carried on exceeded all expectations. It was estimated that fully 7000 people were present the three days, and the number of automobiles parked about the campus was reminiscent of a state fair crowd.

WILL SIMILAR SOILS TAKE LIKE TREATMENT?

One of the Important Questions That Confronts Research Workers Trying to Find Facts for Farmers

Among the experiments now being carried on at the agricultural experiment station at Cornell University, is one to determine whether there is any uniformity in the fertilizer and lime requirements of soils of various types. If it should be found that a soil of a given type will generally need, wherever it occurs, about the same fertilizer or lime treatment then it would be easy to tell the farmer what fertilizer would be profitable on his soil, because each of the principal types would be studied carefully. Such studies, however, require a long period of years before all the soil types, even of one state, could be studied in relation to other fertilizer requirements.

Research workers at the College of Agriculture who would like to undertake this and other studies of the same sort are interested in a bill recently introduced into the national congress by Fred S. Purnell of the committee on agriculture. The purpose of the bill is to give additional funds to the federally supported experiment stations in each state.

The soil surveys so far made merely separate the soils and types by a study of their geological formation. Little is known as to whether the fertilizer requirements of all soils with similar geological histories are likely to be uniform.
