For the consolation and satisfaction of those who have lately received the bodies of their soldier dead and have not had the opportunity of knowing the condition in which they were returned and to give the government all praise due it, this little article is written by one who knows.

The caskets are of solid oak and excepting the high polish are exactly like any of the oak caskets used now in this country so extensively. The handles are of steel gray metal. The oak cover is fastened with twelve-inch screws, which when removed enables the oak cover, full length to be lifted off and underneath is the cover to the metallic casket which is fastened by 32 stud-bolts and a fitted rubber gasket. After removing the burrs the full length metallic cover is removed.

The interior is lined with shirred, brocaded silk as elaborate as the lining of the finest caskets. A padding of shirred silk and wadding six inches thick is placed above the body to keep it in position; remove this and there is the body wrapped in a new white woolen blanket, pinned with safety pins.

Let us take off our hats to Uncle Sam for the splendid manner in which he lays our boys at rest.

In the instance above the body was identified by the gold crown on the eye tooth which was as bright as the day it was set by the dentist. Whitesville News.
