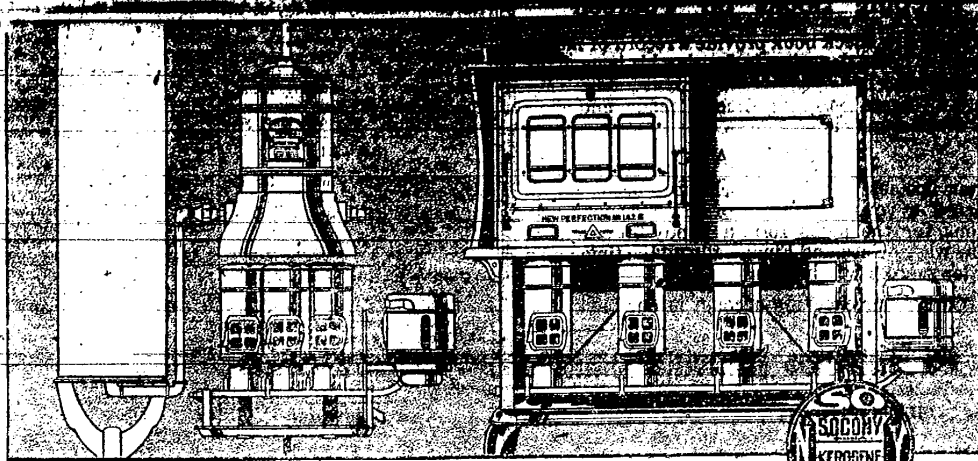

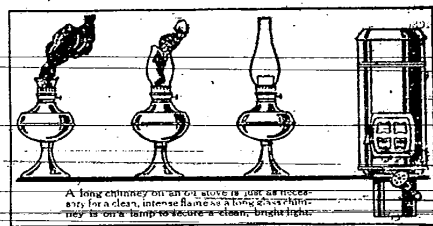

**Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds**

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending June 6, 1921.)

**Hay**  
Markets generally weak. Lower prices prevailing Central Western market other markets practically unchanged but demand almost entirely limited to small local needs. Receipts light country loadings negligible. No. 1 timothy quoted New York \$23.50, Richmond \$26, Atlanta \$29, Memphis \$27.50, Cincinnati \$19.25, Chicago \$23, Minneapolis \$20, St. Louis \$25. No. 1 alfalfa Atlanta \$29, Memphis \$24, St. Louis \$26, Kansas City \$21. No. 1 prairie Minneapolis \$16, St. Louis \$18, Kansas City \$13.

**Feed**  
Offerings of most feedstuffs exceeding demand causing further price declines. Alfalfa meal strong because of continued light production. New crop No. 1 meal quoted Kansas City around \$18. Inquiry slight on expectation that reduced freight rates effective June 10 will cause lower prices. Export and fertilizer demand for cottonseed meal has dropped off; market stagnant. Wheat feeds off 50c. Kansas City and St. Louis markets weak. Demand for most feeds light. Linsed and cotton seed meal less in demand in many markets than at any time this year. Quoted bran \$15, Middlings \$15, Minneapolis; linsed meal \$32.50, Buffalo, \$28.50 Minneapolis 36 percent cottonseed meal \$30.50. Atlanta; beet pulp \$25 seaboard markets; white hominy feed \$23 St. Louis, \$24.50 Chicago; gluten feed \$33.95 Philadelphia, \$26.50 Chicago.

**Dairy Products**

Active storing demand has kept butter markets firm with price tendency upward. The week's into storage movement exceeded 5,000,000 pounds. Receipts continue heavy. Fancy grades especially in demand. To-day's prices average 2c higher than a week ago, 92 score closing: New York 31c; Chicago 30 1/2c; Philadelphia 32 1/2c; Boston 31 1/2c. Cheese markets steady to firm. Current production not yet showing quality necessary for active storing demand and movement of all medium-grade goods into consumptive channels has had some tendency to keep prices down. Prices at Wisconsin primary markets average: Twins 14 1/2c; Daisies 15c; Double Daisies 14 1/2c; Longhorns and Young Americas 15c.

**Fruits and Vegetables**

South Carolina Irish cobbler potatoes up 75c per bbl. New York, reaching \$4.50 to \$4.75. Texas and Louisiana sacked Bliss Triumphs gained 25 to 50c per 100 lbs. St. Louis and Kansas City, closing \$3.25 to \$3.50. Texas yellow Bermuda onions slightly lower in consuming markets at \$1 to \$1.75 per standard crate. California No. 1 stock slightly higher Chicago at \$1.85 to \$1.90. Florida tomatoes in good demand New York at \$5 to \$5.50 per six basket carrier. Supplies liberal. Pittsburg market \$4 to \$4.50. Mississippi 4 basket carriers \$1.50 to \$1.75 Chicago; Texas tomatoes \$1.50 to \$1.75. California salmon tint cantaloupes under heavy haulings declined at shipping points early in the week, closing \$2.25 to \$2.50 per standard crate of 45 melons, carloads f. o. b. cash track. Prices down \$2 to \$4 per crate in consuming markets, at \$5 to \$8; Eastern consuming markets \$6.50 to \$8. Georgia Dixie Queen peaches in six basket carriers and bushel baskets \$1.75 to \$2.75 Eastern markets; Early Rose watermelons, medium size, steady at \$5.00 to \$10.00 per car New York; around \$7.00 Philadelphia with demand moderate.

**Why Do Not Young Women Become Nurses?**

Many articles have been written on this subject in different papers. The principal reasons advanced are: Long hours of work, restriction of personal liberty, insufficient remuneration to allow studies without financial help from relatives or friends, cost of providing suit and apartments.

A study of the conditions prevailing at ST. MARK'S HOSPITAL TRAINING SCHOOL for Nurses shows that the reasons set forth are not generally applicable to the present time, as the hours of duty are about the same length as business hours.

It is to be noted that the course has longer than the usual three years, and is made up of the best of the best, selected young women of the present day, when choosing a means of livelihood, is governed by the material consideration which can be made the most money in the shortest time.

In many cases she will choose a commercial career where she can start at a weekly wage of \$15, and work herself up after years of apprenticeship to \$25 or \$30 a week.

Now this same young woman, after having successfully finished the course at St. Mark's, could enter a TRAINING SCHOOL for NURSES, receive BOARD, LODGING and LAUNDRY the same as in a well regulated boarding school, and have the privilege of the evenings to herself either in or outside the hospital.

A young woman entering at the age of eighteen would have completed her course of training at the age of 21 and be able to make considerably more money than in commercial life.

As a concrete example:

The patients at St. Mark's Hospital are treated just as if they were at a boarding school. They receive an average of 25 patients across the street. These persons board on a weekly basis of \$15.00, including board, laundry, and other expenses.
