Of Interest to Farmers

SPECIAL REPORTS ON WEATHER FARM WORK IS STILL AHEAD AVERAGE YEARS SERVICE TO BE TRIED IN TEN COUNTIES ALLEGANY ONE

A special weather forecast to be given out during the harvesting season will be available to Allegheny farmers thru the Farm Bureau office. The Farm Bureau Manager has made arrangements with the Federal Weather Bureau Department where by this county will be one of ten in New York to try out a special telegraphed daily weather forecast. The service will start June 15th. The forecast will be telegraphed each morning to the county agents, who are co-operating, and any farmers having telephone connections can obtain the reports at any time after 11 o'clock. The forecast will give the opinion of the Weather Bureau as to the kind of weather to be expected on the following day, and when conditions warrant for two or even three days in advance. The Weather Bureau operators do not claim to be infallible, but their records have for a long period of time shown that they are right nearly ninety times out of a hundred.

It is the experience of the agent that a great many people make very good use of the forecasts which are given in the daily papers. If this service has been of value when received in many cases twenty-four hours old, then the telegraphed service which will be received as soon as it gets to the editors of the paper certainly ought to be of a great deal more value.

The Weather Bureau Department is furnishing special information sheets and charts which will help in the complete understanding of their terms and reports. These will be sent by the Farm Bureau manager to anyone in the county who wishes to make consistent and comparatively regular use of this service. It will be given a special trial with a number of farmers in the vicinity of Belmont. It can also be made of just as much use to other farmers thruout the entire county, but until special plans can be worked out, the burden of the telephone charges for this special service will have to be upon the individual. Special arrangements may be made for some communities if desired. The success of the service will depend to a great extent on the individual farmer keeping in close touch with the Farm Bureau office during the hay and grain season.

Up-to-date Commercial Printing at the News Office.

The past week the state over was one of abundant sunshine, with warm days and cool nights, according to the summary of weather and crop conditions for New York for the week ending June 15th by the Ithaca office of the weather bureau. Farm work continued ahead of the average. Showers were general from the eleventh to the thirteenth, but, with the exception of the St. Lawrence Valley, the amount of precipitation was inadequate and rain is still badly needed.

Pastures, meadows, grain and berries were benefited somewhat by the showers, but are still suffering from the drought. Corn, potatoes and beans generally made good growth and were under frequent cultivation. There was some plowing for buckwheat during the week, but the ground was too dry. Alfalfa and clover cutting was under way in some sections, with satisfactory yield.

BARNY OFFER MANY FIELD-DAY EVENTS

Pick of State College Cows, Horses, Sheep and Swine to Be on Display at Ithaca Gathering

The work of dairy improvement associations by cow-testing will be demonstrated for Farmers Field Days visitors at the State College of Agriculture, at Ithaca next week, June 23, 24, 25, and breeding and handling of swine and sheep will also receive attention.

Horses will not be neglected, either; demonstrations of results of breeding will be given with individuals from the Cornell work stables.

Beef cattle for New York State farms will also come in for attention, and the annex of the stock judging pavilion will be the scene of a demonstration of feeds and feed mixtures for all farm animals.

The man or woman interested in live stock and farm animals of any kind will find enough doing around the barns and animal husbandry buildings, to say nothing of the other points of interest in other departments of the college, to keep him busy the whole three days.

Outdoor Event
Practically all of the entertainment provided will be out-of-door, taking the form of demonstrations of results rather than lectures. From the information it already has, the college says that it expects an even larger crowd
