HEALTHMOBILE HERE WEDNESDAY

Do you wait until your watch is worn out before you have it cleaned? When your automobile develops a little knock do you have it looked at or do you wait until you have melted out all the bearings? Isn't it just as important to keep your body running smoothly as our watch or our auto? This is the idea that is back of one of the most important steps in public health work. Great emphasis is now placed on periodic physical examinations while in apparent health and before any symptoms of illness develop, for experience shows that, by such procedure, incipient troubles are promptly detected and easily remedied at little or no expense in money or in suffering while, if they are neglected, disaster results.

Especially in infancy and childhood is this careful, watchful attention necessary for, during early life, any neglected deficiencies, and overlooked handicaps, are very apt to retard development, both physical and mental, and to cause irreparable harm and suffering through life. For this reason, every careful mother, however healthy and vigorous her children may be, has them examined at least once a year. Dental defects, the development of adenoids, the infection of tonsils, faulty nutrition, imperfect sight or hearing may be scarcely noticeable at first and cause little annoyance, but if neglected, the suffering that they may cause can scarcely be exaggerated.

Recognizing the importance of such examinations in childhood the State Department of Health is conducting children's health consultations throughout the state where children from six months to six years of age are given a thorough, careful examination by physicians of wide experience, and Andover is fortunate in being included in the schedule. Examinations will be conducted by capable physicians at the Andover Library, from 1 to 5 p. m., and all mothers are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity to have their children carefully examined. It should be emphasized especially that these consultations are for well children only and sick children will not be admitted. The consultations are for the purpose of keeping well children well and not for the treatment of disease; they are not clinics in any sense of the word and no prescriptions are given, nor operations performed. The children are simply examined, the mother advised and it is very often the case there are defects which require attention, the mother is advised to see her physician. The efforts of the State Department are intended primarily as a demonstration, in the expectation that when the parents have been once shown the value of such work they will make it a practice to have their regular physicians examine their children, and perhaps themselves too, at least once a year.

Featuring this child health campaign is the Healthmobile, which has been secured by the State Department. It is particularly adapted for rural health work as it carries and moves the necessary material to conduct the examinations. It also has a moving picture outfit of the very best and highest type. It supplies its own electricity, making it possible to give motion pictures either indoors or in open air. During the evening a complete program of movies will be shown. Everybody is welcome. The films used are of the greatest possible interest to young and old, being owned and produced by the State Health Department.
