#### WILLOWOOD HOME OF CLARA BARTON

Will Be Preserved as a Memorial to The Founder of the Red Cross

The memory of Clara Barton, founder of the American Red Cross, is to be substantially preserved by the Woman's Universalist Missionary Society, a nation-wide organization connected with the Universalist Church. Papers conveying the Clara Barton homestead on Taft Hill in North Oxford, Mass., has been passed. Her summer home also may be acquired. The society plans to preserve the properties intact.

The Barton homestead consists of the house in which Miss Barton was born, barn, big henry and eighty-five acres of land. Miss Barton's summer home is in Carlton Street and consists of a two-and one-half story house and half an acre of land. Miss Barton was one of the most active and interested members of the Universalist Church. Missionary work of all kinds, at home and in foreign lands, was of special interest to her.

HOME BUREAU MEETING  
Tuesday and Wednesday Next, at 2 P. M.

The Home Bureau will meet at the Methodist Church parlors, next Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, at 2 o'clock, for dress-making instructions and demonstrations by Miss Bertha Coats of Hornell, who submits the following plan for the work to members.

Plan for clothing: Everyone to bring material suitable for a shirt waist, a wash shirt or a simple one-piece dress, a simple pattern, preferably Butterick, needles, thread, pins, thimble, shears, and tape measure. The first day is to be devoted to the use of patterns, cutting and preparing for fittings. The second day will be used for fittings and criticizing of dresses as to suitability of material, becomingness of design, etc. I plan to do as much as possible give instruction that will apply to dressmaking in general as well as to the work at hand.

Membership will be given in the Bureau at 50¢ for the balance of this year.
