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Of Interest to Farmers

LIVESTOCK RATIONS FOR JULY SUGGESTED

The following are the July rations for dairy cows, suggested by the annual advisory committee at the state college of agriculture at Ithaca, N. Y. The approximate wholesale cost is also given. For dairy cows—300 pounds wheat bran, \$3.45; 300 pounds hominy, \$4.52; 300 pounds gluten feed, \$5.11; 100 pounds oil meal, \$1.71; 1000 pounds will cost \$14.83; 100 pounds will cost \$1.48; 2000 pounds will cost \$29.66. For calves and dry stock—300 pounds wheat bran, \$3.47; 500 pounds hominy, \$7.52; 200 pounds oil meal, \$3.41; 1000 pounds will cost \$14.36; 100 pounds will cost \$1.44; 2000 pounds will cost \$28.72. According to the feed quotations of July 1, feeds have again declined somewhat at wholesale. The corn feeds and the wheat feeds are the lowest.

Oil meal is at a comparatively low price along with gluten feed. These two feeds offer a cheaper source of protein than cottonseed meal. During June, distillers grains were at a low point and were considered a very good buy. They seem now to have largely disappeared. There are indications that they have been bought up by manufacturers.

If dairymen are to buy feeds advantageously, they must be on the lookout for such feeds and pick them up at the very lowest point. Distillers grains are a valuable feed and they must be bought when available, for the supply and outlook for them are such that they will not at all times be general on the market. The change in price of oil meal relative to other feeds indicates that a change in mixture will be advantageous from the point of view of price, which accounts for the changes in the suggested mixtures. It will be noted that the wholesale price of the mixtures is below \$30. This is taken to indicate that the bottom of the feed market is nearly reached, and those who are accustomed to buy feed for storage may well do so now.

HEAT FORCES FARMERS TO LEAVE THE FIELDS The past week was marked by extremely high temperatures, especially during the first half, according to the summary of weather and crop conditions for the week ending July 12, sent out from the Ithaca office of the weather bureau. Rain is badly needed over most of the state, although showers relieved the drought locally. The severest drought is being experienced generally over the counties bordering on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. In Oswego County lawns are burned red, and the foliage of shade trees is dropping. Farmers suspended afternoon work in some localities because of the extreme heat.

The wheat harvest is well under way over the southern half of the state, and some rye is also being cut. Haying continued, but with little improvement in yield. Oats are nearly ready to cut in the southern tier of counties. Corn and potatoes generally made good growth and some early potatoes are being dug.

NEW WORLD'S RECORD FOR 200 AND 300 MILES Dodge City, Kansas, July 4th—The annual 300 mile motorcycle classic was won here today by Ralph Hepburn, riding a Harley Davidson, in the World's record breaking time of 3 hours, 30 minutes and 3 seconds, an average of 85 1/2 miles an hour. Jack Seymour, on an Indian, took second place, 14 miles behind Hepburn, and Fred Ludlow won third; Ray Weishear fourth and Otto Walker fifth.

The remarkable records set up by Hepburn and his phenomenal riding were the outstanding features of the race. In addition to winning the race and establishing a new World's record for 300 miles he also put up a new World's 200-mile mark by covering this distance in 2 hours, 17 minutes and 44 seconds.

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BOYS AND GIRLS WILL GET \$3594 IN PRIZES

Some classes at State Fair Contests for Junior Project Workers Only Special Livestock Offers. Boys and girls of the state will have opportunity to compete for \$3594 in prizes for agricultural and home economics work at the state fair this fall. The premium money will be distributed in five sections, three of which are limited to boys and girls enrolled as junior project workers under the direction of the junior extension service of the state college at Ithaca, and two of which are open to every New York boy or girl under 18. In addition to these five classes, the state bankers' association will again offer the Sabin prize Holstein bull, Prince Alcanta Segis, to the county which does the best junior project work. Last year, Prince Segis went to Otsego County. The three sections of the premium list open to junior project workers are \$928 for regular exhibits, \$1500 for demonstration teams, and \$556 for special animal exhibits. The sections open to every boy and girl in the state under 18 are \$310 for individual school exhibits, and \$300 for supervisory district school exhibits. Breed Associations Help This year the fair commission is co-operating with the various breed associations in offering generous premiums to boys and girls to encourage junior project work, so that those who own and have reared animals may enter them for these special premiums. The exhibits of the youngsters will be subject to the same rules and regulations as those of the adults, and will also be entered in the regular classes of the livestock exhibits. In the boys and girls building several teams will give daily demonstrations showing how they fed and cared for their animals and how they kept their records. Here also will be the first exhibit of poultry raised by junior project workers, where teams of the youthful owners will demonstrate how they did it, and will give directions for hatching, brooding, feeding, cutting, and the use of artificial lights.

Yiddish Theater for London. The Jewish population of London, which is about 150,000, is at last to have for the first time a Yiddish theater in the West end. It is proposed to establish a permanent playhouse for the performance of Yiddish plays in Yiddish, with Jewish actors. There is also a project under consideration for the translation of classic drama and the best contemporary plays into Yiddish for performance in the new theater. The best musical comedies will also be adapted to performance there. Jewish actors from many parts of the world have signified willingness to go to London professionally. One of the promised features is a repertoire of 50 different plays to be produced on 50 successive nights.

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GUARD DIGNITY OF PRESIDENT

Washington Theatrical Managers Are Not Allowed to Advertise His Attendance in Their Playhouses.

There is a code of etiquette governing relations between the executive mansion at Washington and the playhouse. Point No. 1 in the code provides that no manager, either of the theater or of the visiting attraction, shall angle for Presidential patronage. When a company arrives at the theater its manager is handed a card which impresses this upon him, and crushes all hopes of using his pet projects for luring the President to confer indorsement upon his offering.

Another point is that a box is reserved in every theater in Washington every day until noon for the President. By that hour the White House is supposed to have notified the theater that the President will attend that evening. Reservations may be made earlier, of course, but in no event may the house or company manager make use of a paragraph in the newspapers announcing that the President will attend on such and such an evening.

The audience is always on the alert to rise when the Presidential party enters, and remains standing at the conclusion of the performance until the White House contingent makes its exit. No Presidential party was ever known to keep a curtain down for a minute through a tardy appearance.

Great Pianist Particular. Paderewski will not permit anybody to sit behind him, says a writer in Hearst's. At some of his concerts hundreds of seats could have been added on the stage. Moreover, in every Paderewski recital no seats are sold in that part of the orchestra proper which is directly behind him. The piano is set at a 45-degree angle, which means that in the extreme left corner of the orchestra, looking toward the stage, a number of seats are directly facing Paderewski's back. Those seats are empty for Paderewski. "If they are behind me, I think they are pushing my elbows," he says. One night he complained: "Will you go down to that woman in the seventh row at the right? She is fanning. I do not mind if she fans in time. But if she cannot do that I cannot play."
