## THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

### Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending July 11, 1921.)

**Grain**  
Prices uncertain and easily influenced during the week with trade local and sentiment rather mixed. The greatest weakness was shown on the fifth account hedging sales and local pressure, but market recovered on the sixth influenced by crop and weather reports. The week ended with prices unsettled. Crop News continues dullish. Country selling wheat freely. Resale prices American wheat in United Kingdom officially quoted much below Argentina; Nevertheless, export demand very slow. Visible supply wheat 8,881,000 bushels, an increase of 820,000 bushels for the week. Dry weather prevails over corn belt. Corn tasseling in practically all sections. Visible supply corn 22,196,000 bushels, a decrease of 2,108,000 bushels for week. In Chicago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.18; No. 2 hard \$1.19 No. 3 mixed corn 59c; No. 3 yellow corn 59c; No. 3 white oats 34c. Compared with July fifth prices, Chicago July wheat closed 1 1/2c higher at \$1.19 July corn 2 1/2c higher at 61 1/2c. Minneapolis July wheat up 6 1/2c at \$1.21 1/2. Chicago September wheat up 2 1/2c at \$1.18 1/2; September corn up 1c at 59 1/2c. Minneapolis September wheat up 4c at \$1.23 1/2; Kansas City September 1 1/2 at \$1.09; Winnipeg October wheat up 6 1/2c at \$1.40 1/2.

**Hay**  
Receipts extremely light. Several markets report no sales and nominal prices. New timothy arriving in central western markets. Demand limited. Buyers awaiting new hay. First car new Colorado alfalfa arrived Kansas City. West coast markets dull but receipts fairly large. No. 1 Timothy quoted New York \$29.50, Richmond \$24, Atlanta \$27, Jacksonville \$26, Cincinnati \$20.50, Chicago \$25, Kansas City New \$15, No. 1 alfalfa Kansas City \$19.50, Atlanta \$27.50, Los Angeles \$17, No. 1 prairie Chicago \$21, Kansas City \$14, Minneapolis \$15, St. Louis \$18.

**Feed**  
Market quiet but steady. Lower prices attracted buyers and the demand improved slightly. Wheat feeds were weak. Cottonseed meal and linseed meal strong. Hominy feed down 1/2; gluten feed unchanged. Alfalfa meal dull, offerings good. Importers quote dried Dutch beet pulp delivered seaboard markets at around \$27 for October, November and December shipments. Season bran quoted \$21.75 delivered North eastern markets quoted bran \$12, middlings \$12, Minneapolis; bran \$21, middlings \$21, Philadelphia; 36 per cent. cottonseed meal \$30 Atlanta, \$30.50 Memphis; white hominy feed \$22, Yellow hominy feed \$21 Chicago; gluten feed \$27.50 Chicago, \$29.71 Phila. No. 1 alfalfa meal \$19.50 Kansas City; linseed meal \$30 Minneapolis; \$35 Buffalo.

**Fruits and Vegetables**  
Lighter potato receipts in eastern markets early in the week advanced prices of Virginia eastern shore Irish cobbles to a range of \$2.75 to \$4.75, highest prices prevailing in New York at \$4.50 to \$4.75. Unusually heavy receipts in New York on Saturday dropped prices \$1 per bbl. eastern cities quoted \$2.75 to \$4.25, at the close. Potato production for the United States as forecast July 1 is 376,997,000 bushels compared with December estimate of last years crop at 430,458,000 bushels.  
Texas tomatoes slow and weak in Chicago at 75c to \$1 per four basket carrier; Tennessee stock \$4 per six basket carrier.  
California salmon tint cantaloupes nearly steady at shipping points; standards 45s ranging \$1.40 to \$1.50 f.o.b. cash track. Consuming markets irregular closing at \$3 to \$4  
Elberta peaches declined 35 to 40c per six basket carrier at Georgia shipping points, reaching \$1.65 to \$1.75 f.o.b. cash track. Consuming markets were weaker also and down 25c to \$1 per crate, closing \$3 to \$3.  
Florida and Georgia Tom Watson watermelons, medium sizes, declined sharply in New York, selling as low as \$250 to \$350 per car but recovered to \$350 to \$550 at the close.

**Dairy Products**  
Butter markets firm; higher price levels reached during the week being sustained. Markets supported by lighter production, poor average quality and conservative demand, and moderate into storage movement. Preliminary storage report covering entire United States for July 1 released today shows stocks 63,750,000 pounds compared with 62,360,000 pounds last year, and 90,158,000 pounds in 1919. Closing prices, 92 score: New York 39c; Chicago 38c; Phila. 39c; Boston 40c.  
Cheese markets firm and trading has been active partly on account of fairly heavy buying by exporters who have operated both on wholesale distributing markets and at primary markets. Quality showing effect of hot weather. Production decreasing. Prices at Wisconsin primary markets average; Twins 14c; daises 15 1/2c

double daises 15 1/2c; longhorns 15 1/2c young Americans 16 1/2c

**Livestock and Meats**  
Practically all changes and grades of livestock at Chicago show net advances over prices of a week ago. Hogs up 25c to 70c; beef steers 10c to 25c; butcher cows and heifers 25c to 60c. Veal calves advanced 75c to \$1.25 per 100 pounds. Feeder steers were dull throughout with prices unchanged. Fat lambs and fat ewes gained 25c to 75c. Feeding lambs were about a quarter and yearlings 25c to 50c higher. July 11 Chicago prices: Hogs top \$10.15; bulk of sales \$9.10 to \$10.10; medium and good beef steers \$7.25 to \$8.65; butcher cows and heifers \$4 to \$8.50; feeder steers \$5.75 to \$7.50; light and medium weight veal calves \$8.25 to \$10.75; fat lambs \$9 to \$11.75; feeding lambs \$6 to \$7; yearlings \$6 to \$8.75; fat ewes \$3 to \$5.25. Stocker and

feeder shipwells down \$1.00; hogs markets during the week ending July 1 were; cattle and calves \$4.17; hogs \$6.46; sheep \$18.092. Eastern wholesale fresh meats prices advanced. Lamb up \$2 to \$3; pork loins 50c to \$2; beef \$1 to \$1.50; veal and mutton generally \$1 per 100 pounds. July 11 prices good grade meats; beef \$15 to \$16; veal \$15 to \$19; lamb \$26 to \$30; mutton \$10 to \$17; light pork loins \$21 to \$25; heavy loins \$18.50 to \$20.

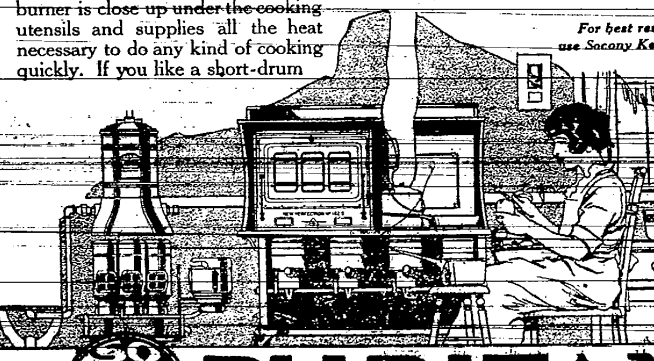

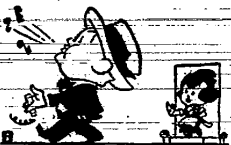
