COW TESTING DAIRIES

MAKE SOME RECORDS

St. Lawrence Cow Beats World in Milk Production for Holstein-Friesian Senior Two-Year-Olds; Last Report Shows

One world's record broken and the highest production recorded in more than a year is the information contained in the summary report of the dairy improvement associations in the state, for the month of May, just compiled by the state supervisor of the work.

Lurdas Colantha Princess Inka, owned by E. M. Lumley, of the Richville Association in St. Lawrence County, has broken the world's record for Holstein-Friesian senior two-year-olds by producing 4959.9 pounds of milk in sixty days. Her thirty-day record was 2560 pounds of milk, seven-day record, 623 pounds, and she gave 90.3 pounds, or 42 quarts of milk in one day.

Turning the cows out to pasture gave a decided impetus to both milk and butter fat production throughout the state, but those dairy-men who fed some grain along with the fresh pasture seemed to get best results. Even with the general increase in production, Hygeia Peonia Pontiac Scotia, a Holstein-Friesian, owned by George McPherson and Son of Newark Valley, of the First Tioga County Association led all other cows in the state for the period of the report with 101.64 pounds of butter-fat to her credit and 3,080.1 pounds of milk.

Two Other Good Ones

The same dairy placed two other cows among the highest five in the state. Ahwaga Butter Girl gained third place in butter fat production, with 93.78 pounds and second place in amount of milk with 2604.9 pounds, while Pansy led with Johanna Vale, in the same association but owned by Jabez Smith and Son, for fourth place, each having produced 90 pounds of fat. Pansy, however, was fifth in milk production with 2142.3 pounds.

Dutchess Walker DeKol, a Holstein-Friesian owned by D. T. Graves of the Erie County Association, holds second place for butter fat with 90.03 pounds. The third highest in milk production was a Holstein-Friesian owned by William Stagner, of the First Niagara County Association, with 529.6 pounds; fourth honors went to the Chenango Valley Association, where another Holstein-Friesian owned by Allen R. Chappel gave 2204 pounds of milk during the month.

DELICIOUS DISHES

MADE FROM WHEY

Watersy Fluid Remaining After Making Cottage Cheese Has Valuable Food Elements - A Good Recipe

When the milk sours and the housewife makes cottage cheese of the curd, she still hasn't done her entire duty in providing her table with summer delicacies unless she has used the whey, say economic workers at the State College at Ithaca.

This watersy fluid which remains after the curd has been removed contains too valuable materials, it is pointed out, to be poured down the kitchen sink. If not only possesses both of the growth-promoting substances so important in a satisfactory diet, but also holds in solution some lime, phosphorus and carbohydrates.

The slight acidity of whey makes it almost a rival of lemon and other fruit jellies as a basis for gelatin molds, frozen desserts, salads and pudding sauces.

The following recipe for whey mint salad is vouchsafed by the Cornell home economics school: 1 1/2 tablespoons gelatin, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup finely chopped fresh mint, 2 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar, 2 cups whey, salt.

Soak the gelatin in 1/4 cup of cold water and dissolve it by setting the cup in a pan of hot water. Strain the whey thru a cheese cloth and add the gelatin, sugar, mint and the acid. Pour the mixture into molds, and chill. The salad may be tinted green with any vegetable coloring matter before it is poured into molds if desired. Serve it with any salad dressing.

DOCTORING ANIMALS

IS TICKLISH TASK

In Long Run It Pays to Call Veterinarian for Milk Livestock, Successful Farmer Finds

That every farmer can be his own veterinarian, vaccinate his own livestock, and otherwise look after the health of his animals by medical and surgical practices is like saying that the average lawyer or doctor is qualified to take a living by farming at daylight, according to successful farmers of this state.

With the present interest in eradicating tuberculosis and other diseases from New York herds and flocks, some persons have written to the State College at Ithaca and to other authorities asking for directions for vaccinating their animals against disease. The one instance of immunization from hog cholera, say the specialists, shows that written directions for the operation would be as unsatisfactory as telling by mail how to play a piano, milk a cow, or plead a case before a jury. Different treatment is required for different conditions, and the experience and training of the operator often determine proper treatment.

Things to Consider

Whenever a herd is to be immunized, the following things, among many others, must be considered: The proper sterilization of instruments; the number, age, and condition of hogs to be treated; whether or not they are pregnant sows or sucking pigs; the keeping qualities of the serum and virus; the presence of other diseases; and most important of all, the correct diagnosis of the disease. "As dawn comes before the day, so diagnosis should always precede treatment," said a veterinarian the other day.

If the immunization consisted merely in injecting the serum under the skin, then a farmer should become proficient and do his own vaccinating, according to the experts.

Similarly, almost anyone can follow directions and apply the test for tuberculosis in cattle, but it requires skill and experience to interpret correctly the test after it has been given.

It has been found that the best and cheapest way, in the long run, is to employ a licensed veterinarian for all cases of sickness in animals, and then follow carefully his directions.

ADRIAN ONLY ENGLISH POPE

Is Said to Have Been Elevated to High Office Contrary to His Own Inclinations.

Pope Adrian IV was by birth an Englishman, and the only one of that nation who ever occupied the papal throne. He was a native of Langley, in Hertfordshire. He was born before A. D. 1100. His real name was Nicholas Breakspear. He is said to have left England as a beggar, and to have become a servant as lay brother in a monastery near Avignon, in France, where he studied with such diligence that in 1137 he was elected abbot. His merits soon became known to Pope III, who made him cardinal-bishop of Albano in 1154, and sent him two years later as his legate to Denmark and Norway, where he converted many inhabitants to Christianity. Soon after his return to Rome, Nicholas was unanimously chosen pope against his own inclination, in November, 1154. Henry II of England, on hearing of his election, sent the abbot of St. Albans and three bishops to Rome with his congratulations.
