Miss Mary O'Toole Nominated as Municipal Court Judge

Miss Mary O'Toole, formerly of Hornell, and for several years a prominent practicing attorney in Washington, D. C., has been nominated by President Harding to be judge of the municipal court of the District of Columbia.

Miss O'Toole was born in Hornell, where for many years she was popular and well-known young business woman. She is a sister of Police Captain Thomas O'Connor and a niece of Miss Mary Hodgins. She first left that city to go to Bath to accept a position as stenographer in the office of Monroe Wheeler, then surrogate judge of this county. Her connection with Judge Wheeler gave her a keen interest in the law, the study of which she soon took up. Within a few years she had been admitted to the bar, and then went to Washington to practice her profession. Since then she has met with constant success, both in her law practice and in a business and financial way. At present she is a director of one of the largest banks of Washington.

Miss O'Toole has many close friends who have watched her rise in the world with great satisfaction. Her success, however, has been a surprise to no one acquainted with her brilliant capabilities, energy and commanding personality. She is the only woman jurist in the District of Columbia.

LAD DROWNED AT CUBA

History of Potato.

"The potato entered this country," Dr. Lauder said, in an address before the American Association for the Advancement of Science, "not as introduced by De Candolle, through an alleged band of Spanish adventurers, but in a perfectly respectable manner from Bermuda, where it had been introduced some years previously from England. It is a frank of fortune that the potato, originally a denizen of Chile and Peru, appears as a naturalized Englishman in the United States. The potato had arrived in England about 1580, or a little later."
