THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received from the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending August 8, 1921)

Hay

Eastern hay markets inactive. Receipts light. Prices practically unchanged. Receipts good but below demand in central west and prices for No. 1 timothy advanced \$2 per ton at Chicago and Cincinnati.

Feed

Recent heavy rains in most important dairying sections have materially reduced the demand for feedstuffs of every description. Severe decline in grain markets and prospective freight reductions also served to check demand.

Grain

Wheat prices were under selling pressure most of the week but export buying kept markets fairly firm for two days. Declines then set in and wheat prices dropped to new low levels.

Minneapolis September wheat down 3 1/2 c closing at 1.27 1/2, Kansas City September wheat down 3 1/2 c closing at 1.11 1/2. Chicago December wheat closed at \$1.25 1/2; December corn at 57 1/2 c.

Fruits and Vegetables

Virginia eastern shore Irish cobbler potatoes continued to advance, closing 50 c higher in New York at a range of \$4.75 to \$5 per bbl. other markets mostly \$5 to \$6.

Dairy Products

Butter markets slightly weaker with prices about 1/2 c lower than early part of week. Receipts running light and dealers making efforts to avoid accumulations of stocks.

Livestock and Meats

A good rally following early declines brought the hog market top 10c above a week ago, but left the bulk of sales 5c to 15c lower. Heavy hogs suffered the greatest loss in value.

Laws of New York - By Authority Chap. 51.

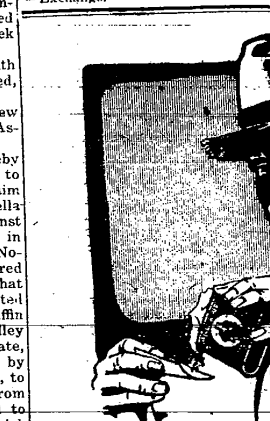
