A FEW NEEDS

(For All Parties)

The state is heavily in debt. Taxes must be high for years. No one knows the value of a dollar as well as the man who works for it. No dollar of the taxpayer's money should be spent without the people getting a dollar's worth out of it. Along certain lines however, the state cannot afford to do less than its utmost.

I am in favor of strong measures to protect the public health, especially against tuberculosis.

I am in favor of liberal assistance for our agricultural schools and experiment stations that we may not be outstripped by other states in agricultural progress.

I am in favor of even greater expenditures for better roads. No other single factor can do so much to lower farming costs and bring producer and consumer nearer together.

I am in favor of a "truth in the fabric" law that the buyer may know whether he is getting wool, shoddy or cotton.

\$50,000,000 was stolen by worth less stock concerns from the people of this state alone last year. Can't something be done to stop it?

I am opposed to the exemption from taxation for a term of years, of new buildings in the cities. It helps to still further draw our population to the cities and throws a heavier burden of taxation on the villages and country. If any property were exempted from taxation it should be our timber resources, with certain restrictions, that the next generation may know what a saw log looks like.

I am opposed to the issuing of tax free securities. This class of securities are held mostly by the very rich. The poorest shack in town or the most dilapidated farm must be taxed according to its value, but a man may have millions in tax exempt securities and not pay one cent in taxes.

Briefly, I am in favor of every measure that will help the people of our county morally, physically or financially or protect them from the cheat and crook.
