### THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C. for the week ending August 22, 1921.)

**Corn**  
Chicago, Sept. wheat, closed at \$1.17, a loss of 7/8c for the week. Chicago Sept. corn lost 3/4c closing at 53 1/2c on the 15th sentiment inclined toward buying, but declines were general from the 16th to the 20th, and December wheat, and all deliveries of corn sold at new lows on the crop. Main depressing influences were lack of support, liquidation of long holdings, discouraging business reports and weakness in coarse grains, stocks and foreign exchange. On the 22nd Chicago Sept. wheat advanced 2 1/2c net after reaching new low; Sept. corn 1 1/2c. Sentiment is now mixed but there is a general belief that further liquidation is inevitable, despite liberal export business. Visible supply wheat 38,552,000 bushels, a decrease of 962,000 bushels for the week; visible supply corn 9,909,000 bushels, a decrease of 2,620,000 bushels. For the week Minneapolis September wheat lost 8 1/2c closing at \$1.24 1/2; Kansas City September down 8c at \$1.07; Winnipeg October down 12c at \$1.37 1/2. No. 2 red winter wheat closed at \$1.19 1/2; No. 2 hard \$1.19 1/2; No. 2 mixed corn 54 1/2c; No. 2 yellow 54 1/2c; No. 3 white oats 30 1/2c.

**Dairy Products**  
Butter market weak and prices have declined 3c during the past seven days. Production showing slight increase following more favorable weather conditions in some producing sections. Recent high prices have apparently hurt consumptive demand. Closing prices: 92 score; New York, Philadelphia and Boston 41c; Chicago 38c.

More confidence shown in cheese markets and undertone much more settled than a week ago. Trading at Wisconsin primary markets especially has shown considerable improvement; August 22nd prices average: Twins 18c; Daisies 17 to 18 1/2c; Double Daisies 17 to 18c; Young Americas and Longhorns 20 1/2c.

**Hay**  
Prices declined heavily under increased receipts in western markets. Recent advances at Chicago and Cincinnati also lost. No. 2 timothy sell at wide discounts under No. 1 in several markets. Eastern market

dull, demand light. Alfalfa and prairie prices steady but movement slow. Practically no buying demand. No. 1 timothy quoted Aug. 22: New York \$30.50, Philadelphia \$24, Atlanta \$26.50, Pittsburgh \$22, Cincinnati \$19; Chicago \$24, Minneapolis \$19, St. Louis \$23, Memphis \$24, No. 1 alfalfa Atlanta \$28, Memphis \$22, Cincinnati \$22, No. 1 prairie St. Louis \$15, Chicago \$17, Minneapolis \$14.50.

**Feed**  
Few changes in prices of feedstuffs. Bran was the only weak future, other feeds steady. Demand light. Buyers indifferent account generally favorable weather for crops and lower prices current for grains. High protein feeds situation considered fairly strong. Old crop cottonseed meal stocks light; a heavy volume of new crop meal not expected until Oct. 1. Linseed meal supplies fair. Export demand for oilcake reported slightly improved. Alfalfa meal dull, prices steady. Cornfeeds fairly firm but in poor request except for immediate prompt shipment. Quoted Aug. 22: Bran \$13.75, middlings \$14.50 Minneapolis; gluten feed \$30.50 Chicago; \$35.71 delivered Philadelphia rate points; white hominy feed \$24 St. Louis, 25 Chicago; No. 1 alfalfa meal \$19.50 Kansas City, \$20.50 St. Louis; linseed meal \$38.50 Minneapolis; 36 per cent. cottonseed meal (old crop) \$35.50 Atlanta.

**Fruits and Vegetables**  
Eastern potato markets have been slow and prices nearly steady during the past week. New Jersey sacked Irish cobbler range \$3.25 to \$3.65 per 100 lbs. in eastern wholesale markets. Giants have been selling to jobbers at \$2.85 to \$3.35. A substantial decrease in shipments from New Jersey occurred during the week and movement from Minnesota increased. Idaho and Colorado sacked white varieties ranged \$2.75 to \$3.50 in Midwestern markets.

**Livestock and Meats**  
Chicago prices declined approximately \$2 per hundred lbs. on the 22nd, making a net decline ranging from \$1.15 to \$1.65 for the week. Beef steers down 40c to 65c; fat cows and heifers 25c to 50c; feeder steers and veal calves practically unchanged. Fat lambs lost 15c to 25c lower grades feeding lambs up 25c. Fat ewes unchanged; yearlings weak to 20c lower. August 22, Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$9.75 (one load out of line), bulk of sales \$7.25 to \$9.35; medium and good beef steers \$6.60 to \$9.60; butcher cows and heifers \$3.50 to \$8.50; feeder steers \$6.25 to \$7.75; light and medium weight veal calves \$7.50 to \$9.26; fat lambs \$8.25 to \$10.50; feeding lambs \$6.50 to \$8.50; yearlings \$6.5 to \$8.15; fat ewes \$2.25 to \$5.25.
