## DEADLY GAS IN FARMERS' SILOS

den Warned Not To Enter Partly Filled Silo Without First Letting in Fresh

Turn the machine blower on anleave it on for at least two minutes before anyone is permitted to enter a partly filled silo. Unless this rule is followed the result is likely to be dead men, says the United States Depart ant of Agriculture.

Annually fatalities occur among farmers and their helpors as a result of the workmen entering half-filled silos after the deadly carbon monoxide spases have hed a chance to accumulate directly above the freshly ensiled corn. A few days ago two Illinois farmers were killed and another was rendered seriously sick by silo gases which are almost as dangerous as the poisonous mustard gases used during the recent war. In this instance, one of the farm workmen entered a 60-foot silo which had been half filled the previous day. Some

partly filled silo, after the ensiled corn has had an opportunity to deelop poisonous carbon gases to the extent that they are endered harmless. After the blower as been operated for two minutes, is perfectly safe for the workmen enter. Another precaution which hould be practiced religiously is not to wedge the silo doors into place until they are needed to prevent the waste of the ensiled corn. Many farmers follow the practice of placing most of the doors before any great amount of corn is cut and deposited in the silo.
