## GORDON REPLIES

### TO NEWS CRITICISM

Says Dickstein Bill Was For Jews Only. Being So It Should Have Been Deleted

The Andover News, Andover, N. Y. Thanks, Brother Backus! I am glad to get a glimpse of my article of Aug. 19, as it appears thru the eyes of somebody else. You certainly made it clear that you did not approve of my attitude relative to the Dickstein Sunday business bill or the publication of the session laws.

Your knowledge of the Dickstein Sunday bill is evidently limited to the information I have given concerning it. I have to pay advertising rates for everything I say, thru the newspaper. I have to work for my money, and naturally try to cover as much ground in an article as I can by making my references to any one subject as condensed as possible. I left out any reference to one provision of the Dickstein bill which would have given you and your readers a clearer understanding of the fact that the bill was for Jews only. The bill did NOT apply outside the large cities. It would not have affected in any way the Seventh-day people of this county.

In this county the newspaper men have a fair business agreement among themselves whereby each paper prints the session laws in turn. However the general rule thru the state seems to have been to give the work to the paper that could apply the most whitewash to its own party and mud to the other. The newspapers that dared to criticize their own party were liable to find themselves disciplined by losing the job. I believe the newspapers are freer to serve the people with this party club removed from over their heads.

I agree with you that the poor man should have free access to the session laws, however, but two of the fifteen papers of this county are allowed to print the session laws which means that 85 per cent. of the people do not get them at all. A postal to the secretary of state at Albany will bring in pamphlet form copies of all session laws on any subject that may be called for.

You refer to a new plan for the circulation of the session laws. I have not seen it, but if you interpret it correctly it would appear that the taxpayer's interests have not been considered.

newspaper quotation I used appear to me to refer to the session publication law itself which the politicians found could be made so useful to them and not to the newspaper men who were awarded contracts according to the law's provisions.
