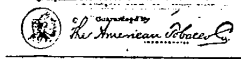

September 17, 1787, Constitution day. Prof. Edward Ross, University of Wisconsin, in a book entitled, "What is America?" takes for his text words from George Mason's Bill of Rights affirmed by the burgesses of Virginia before the founding of the U. S. "Without a firm adherence to justice, Moderation, Temperance, Frugality and Virtue, no free government or the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people."
The words of a sermon of August 17, 1894, are: "In the 147 years of our existence we have fulfilled our destiny as we have approximated the virtues set forth by farmer George Mason... and another, a carpenter. America is out-and-out a religiously founded nation, on the religion of humanity. So many churches, so many church-members, so much for church-extension do not necessarily make a nation religious; but justice and mercy and righteousness — by these tests. Always man and nation must come before the blaze of principles in action, fleshed and in the machinery of the nation, its schools, churches, industries, politics.
In America the elevation of the people — determine — what is the program's approximation. A government of, for and by the people — calls for high-grade people. With large elements of weaklings, incompetents, parasites, leisured classes, snobs, clannists, sectionalists, loading the body politic down, we shall fail to improve the world as big.
In every department of American life there is clamor to Americanize Americans. Panic has obsessed the punts of some seers as they behold the chaos in American life. Large numbers of the population do not seem constrained to do justice. These conflict between labor and capital that has shadowed millions of homes. Hegel, a great philosopher, pointed out that as the race evolves the moral and mental disorder between customs and laws.
It would seem that by this time Labor and Capital should have found some "custom" and "mity" of relationship. Justice would get them together one would think!
Masterlink, echoing Jesus, lifts Fair Play as a goal for humanity's best expression of its reason for being.
Someone has said that the poets of this age, who have a right to be heard are those who interpret to this generation the exalted religion of Fair Play.
This slogan interprets the religion of any exalted people, and if we say it is truly American we do not vaunt. For the truest Americanism is a step toward the federation of the world! Pray God for a religion that breaks down classes, clans, sects, and brings all relationship down to the bed-rock of Fair Play.

To Saraswati is attributed invention of the complicated musical instrument of the "vina." Vocal music in India dates back to the chanting of the Sham Veda. The Vedas were written about 2500 B. C. and contain references to several musical instruments.
The Hindu system of notation has seven notes and was perfected about 350 B. C., passing from India through Persia to Arabia, and introduced into Europe in 1022 A. D. by Guido d'Arezzo, a Benedictine monk.

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China to Have Large Mint. One of the largest mints in the world, with a possible daily output of 500,000 silver dollars, is to be erected at Shanghai, China, at a cost of about \$2,000,000, under the direction of an American expert. When completed, in about two years, it will absorb some 14 tons of silver a day in its task of establishing a standardized currency in China, where the present unit of value, the Mexican dollar, competes with as many varieties of coin as there are provinces. The Chinese tael, now used for reckoning, is not a coin at all, but a measured slug of silver, the value of which varies in different parts of the country.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

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
