The rains were very beneficial to late com and postoses and improved pastures to marked degree. Slio filling is about completed in most sections, and potatodigging is well under way. There appears to be less blight than usual. Fall seeding is progressing with soil in good condition. The buckwheat harvest is under way with fair yields reported. Apples, grapes and plums are being marketed. Light fosts were reported from some points in the northern part of the State.
