OCTOBER LIVESTOCK RATIONS SUGGESTED

The following are the October rations for dairy cowe, with appressimate wholesale costs, suggested by the animal husbandry workers at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca, M. Y. There is no difference from the September formulas, except for prices.

For dairy cows—300 pounds wheat bran, \$2.43; 300 pagnads hominy (yellow if possible) \$4.14; 300 pounds gluten feed, \$5.52; 100 pounds oil meal, \$2.22; 1,000 pounds will cost \$1.53; 2,000 pounds will cost \$15.30; 000 pounds w

\$30.64.
For calves and young stock—300 pounds wheat bran, \$3.43;500 pounds hominy or com meal, \$6.90; 200 pounds oil meal, \$4.46; 1,000 pounds will cost \$14.79; 100 pounds will cost \$29.58.
Since September 17th there has been some falling off in the prices of feeds, the college workers report. The fall in price has been sufficient to reduce the cest of the suggested mixreduce the cost of the suggested mix ures nearly \$2 a ton over the Sep-

tember price.


