**Ancient Dye - Too Costly.**

Tyrian purple, the most famous dye of antiquity, was so expensive that in the reign of Diocletian one pound of purple wool cost \$240, which would make the dye itself worth about \$5,000 a pound. In 1909 Professor Friedlander gathered 12,000 of the sea snails from which this ancient dye was made, and prepared a little of the coloring matter. His investigations showed it to be identical with a dye known to synthetic chemists, but not used on account of its inferiority to other synthetic dyes which are both cheap and common at the present day.

**SAVE BY ELECTRICITY**

What it Means to Secure the Most of Power

You who live in cities where the electricity is a thing to be taken for granted, realize only too fully the value of a better, more economical type of a building, where electricity is used if you could see what has to be done in Green Mountain Falls, Colo., before we have any power.

In the first place, we don't have any electric light at all until 5 or 6:30 o'clock in the evening. And the only reason that we have that is because the men who manage the power plant, which is situated west at the top of a mountain, start their long and fatiguing climb every night about 6:30 and turn on the lights for us.

It may sound very simple and all that, but it is not. The men who manage the power house, way up there against the side of an exceedingly steep and rocky mountain, you would change your mind about it. They say the climb is about a mile, and sometimes in the midst of a severe, thunder storm, when the rain is falling (that down the mountain) and the falls are roaring in mountain tones, and the trees are swaying and moaning in the wind, you wonder how the men ever reach the top of all that and are more than thankful that the lights finally go on. For that is our only way of knowing that the men have reached there safely. — Kansas City Star.
