POULTRY KEEPING COURSE IN SHORT WRITER COURSE

Theory and Practice are Combined in Work Offered at Cornell University
Nov. 1 to Feb. 14

Men and women who wish to engage in practical poultry work, whether for themselves or in managing plants for others may receive practical instruction in the winter poultry courses offered by the State College of Agriculture at Cornell University. These courses begin November 9th and continue thru February 17th, with about two weeks vacation for Christmas. Courses covering every phase of practical poultry keeping are offered. The practical course for those having six months or more experience with poultry, requires a person's whole time.

The courses offered by the college are said to furnish a desirable combination of theory and practice. Ample opportunity is given during the course for students to get instruction in the various branches of poultry keeping, and to work out their own special problems. It is stated the men and women taking the courses perform the various operations with their own hands, thus having the practical application of the principle taught. Tuition is free to residents of New York State. Complete announcements of the winter courses can be obtained by writing to the secretary of the college at Ithaca, N. Y.

FURNELL BILL PROPOSED HELP IN RESEARCH WORK

Federal Aid for Agricultural Studies May Come as Result of Pending Legislation

The Cornell University agricultural experiment station has recently received a copy of the bill introduced into the House of Representatives by Congressman Fred S. Furnell for the purpose of appropriating agricultural research and experiments.

This bill proposes funds to be applied to paying the expense of investigations in agriculture, and is for the support of experiments which bear directly on the production, manufacture, preparation, use, distribution and marketing of agricultural products. Under its provisions will be included scientific studies to establish and maintain a permanent and efficient agriculture. It also provides for other investigations intended to aid and improve the rural home life in general.

Those who have been in touch with the agricultural situation in this country have said that while large appropriations have been made for extending agricultural knowledge, funds for discovering and developing new facts have not been adequate. The Furnell bill attempts to remedy the situation, so that the efforts to teach new farm facts shall not outstrip the ability of scientists and investigators to learn these facts. The work of the New York Experiment Stations at Cornell University and at Geneva can be made more effective if they have more federal aid.

Persons who are interested in the work of the experiment stations and who wish to see the proposed legislation by which these stations may more fully meet the needs of the people of the state, may obtain copies of the bill by writing to Congressman Fred S. Furnell, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C.

FARM YOUNG FOLKS MAY KEEP ACCOUNTS

Boys and Girls of 12 to 18 Learn Business Principles in New Work of Junior Extension

A project in farm accounting has been added to the twelve others offered to boys and girls of the state as part of the junior extension work of the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca. The work is limited to children between 12 and 29, and is divided into two classes suited to children of different ages.

Both begin January 1st with a complete farm inventory, include the keeping of farm accounts throughout the year, in cash books furnished by the college and end with another inventory at the end of the year.

Real Business Methods

The work has been outlined for the youngsters by the department of agricultural economics and farm management, of the college, and a contract is suggested, to be drawn between the young bookkeepers and their employers, whether parents or not.

This contract provides that either for a fixed sum or a percentage of the income as shown by the records kept, the boy or girl agrees to keep accurate accounts as directed and to deliver them to the farm proprietor at the end of the year.

It is expected that this new project of the junior extension service will train older boys and girls in simple business methods and enable them to help their parents and others to study the farm business in a businesslike way, and from the work of the older children to compute income taxes and other bothersome parts of farm accounting.

SHEEP BREEDERS TO HOLD MEETINGS

Annual and Demonstration Meetings Nov. 2 to 5

The first week in November will be an active one for the sheep interests in Allegany County. The annual meeting of the Sheep Breeders Association will be held in Angelica Grange Hall on Wednesday, November 2nd, beginning at 10 a. m. Mr. F. E. Robertson, manager of the State Cooperative Sheep Breeders Association, will be the speaker at this meeting and will inform the members of the actions of the State Organization during the past year, and will discuss with them suggestions for work during the coming season. There will also be an important business session for the members at this same meeting.

County Agent Raymond has arranged a series of five barn demonstration meetings for the sheep breeders on November 3, 4 and 5. Mr. W. T. Gramms, in charge of the sheep husbandry work at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca, will be the speaker at these meetings. In addition to the demonstration work on Selection of Breeding Stock, Mr. Gramms will speak on the topic of Fall and Winter Care and Management. Following is the schedule of these meetings:

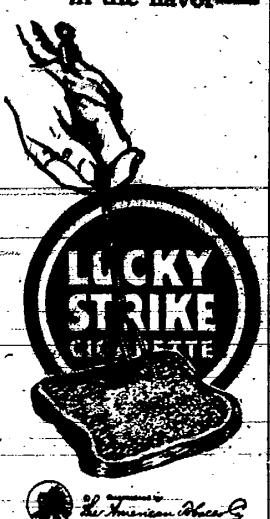
