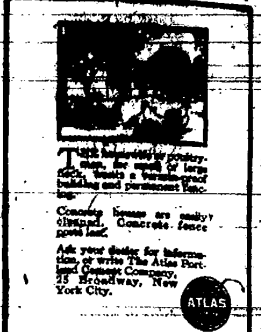

## THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending Oct. 24th, 1921.)

**Corn**  
There were heavy declines in grain prices the first three days of week, but market then turned firm induced by somewhat over-sold condition, good export business and reduced hedging pressure from northwest. On the 22nd a reduction in freight rates for grain, grain products and hay was ordered by the interstate commerce commission. Milling demand continues fairly good with soft red winter premiums sharply higher. Visible supply wheat 55,687,000 bushels, a decrease of 280,000 bushels for week. Threatened rail strike has cut down movement of grains to terminal markets. Visible supply corn 19,668,000 bushels, an increase of 2,350,000 for week. Closing prices in Chicago east market: No. 2, red winter wheat \$1.20; No. 2, hard winter wheat \$1.06; No. 2 mixed corn 47c; No. 2, yellow corn 47c; No. 3, white oats 31c. Average price to farmers in Central Iowa for No. 2 mixed corn about 31 1/2c; to farmers in central North Dakota for No. 1, dark northern wheat \$1.08 1/2; to farmers in Central Kansas for No. 2, hard winter wheat 95c. For the week Chicago December wheat down 2c closing at \$1.08; Chicago December corn up 2c at 48c. Minneapolis December wheat closed at \$1.22 1/2; Kansas City December wheat \$1.00 1/2; Winnipeg December wheat \$1.08 1/2. Chicago May wheat closed at \$1.12 1/2; Chicago May corn 53 1/2c; Minneapolis May wheat \$1.21; Kansas City May wheat \$1.04 1/2; Winnipeg May wheat \$1.13 1/2.

**Fruit and Vegetables**  
Chicago potato market declined during the week, other cities fairly steady. Carlot shipments lighter, total 10,070 cars. New York round whites up 10c at shipping pints at \$1.95 to \$2 per 100 lbs sacked. Strong in eastern city markets at \$2.25 to \$2.35. Northern round whites slightly weaker at shipping points at \$1.60 to \$1.80; down 20 to 25c in Chicago carlot market at \$1.75 to \$1.90, slightly weaker in Cincinnati at \$2.15 to \$2.35.

Total apple shipments 7483 cars. New York baldwins A2 1/2, steady at shipping points at \$6.25 to \$6.50 per bbl. \$7 to \$7.50 in most markets, slightly lower in Pittsburg at \$6.50. Northwestern extra fancy boxed Jonathans slow and steady in most markets at \$2 to \$2.25.

Cabbage markets slightly weaker. New York Danish type steady at shipping points at \$30 per 100 bulk; weaker in New York and Philadelphia at \$35 to \$38. Northern Danish firm at shipping points at \$30 to \$35, weaker in city markets at \$40 to \$44.

**Livestock and Meats**  
Chicago hog prices declined 50c to 60c during the week, light hogs losing most. Beef steers and butcher cows and heifers down 25c to 50c. Fat lambs advanced 15c to 25c; feeding lambs steady. Fat ewes and better grades of yearlings generally 25c higher. Oct. 24 Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$8.30; bulk of sales \$7.75 to \$8.25; medium and good beef steers \$5.85 to \$10.55; butcher cows and heifers \$3.50 to \$9; feeder steers \$4.95 to \$7; light and medium weight veal calves \$9 to \$11.50; fat lambs \$7.75 to \$9; feeding lambs \$6.75 to \$7.75; yearlings \$5 to \$7.50; fat ewes \$3 to \$7.25.

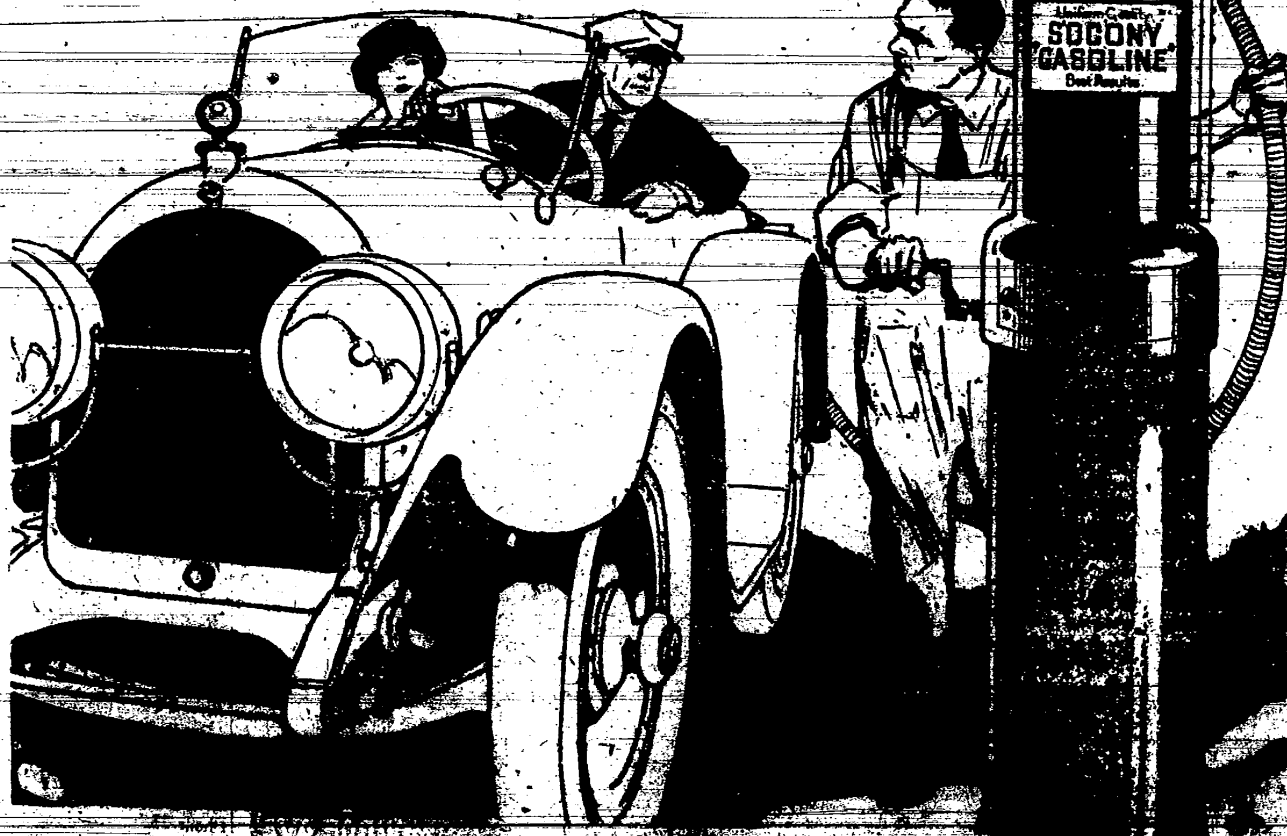
Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices were not materially changed from those prevailing a week ago. Beef and veal steady; lamb, mutton and fresh pork bins steady to 1c lower. Oct. 24 prices good grade meats: Beef \$14 to 16; veal \$18 to \$21; lamb \$17 to \$19; mutton \$10 to \$12; light pack loins \$25 to \$29; heavy loins \$16 to \$22.
