

THE ANDOVER HIGH SCHOOL

The High School is one of the strong institutions of Andover. The District was organized as a Union Free School District on Feb. 11, 1892 and came directly under the control of the Regents of the University. It was granted a High School chartr The present building was erected in 1903, at a cost of \$20,000.

The school is free of access to a large rural section and fully 15 per cent. of all the students come from outside the district. There are over 200 pupils in the grades and 68 in the high school department. There are
