



**THE ANDOVER HIGH SCHOOL**

The High School is one of the strong institutions of Andover. The District was organized as a Union Free School District on Feb. 11, 1892 and came directly under the control of the Regents of the University. It was granted a High School charter. The present building was erected in 1903, at a cost of \$20,000.

The school is free of access to a large rural section and fully 15 per cent. of all the students come from outside the district. There are over 200 pupils in the grades and 68 in the high school department. There are ten teachers who are constantly on the alert to increase the efficiency of the school.

The Board of Education is composed of representative citizens who are doing everything possible to make the school the very best. They hold their meetings on the first Tuesday night of each month and it is seldom that any member is absent.

The number preceding each subject is the number of Regents counts given for that subject. Any student completing this course with a total of at least 72 credits will be granted a college entrance diploma in arts which will entitle him to enter any college without examination.

The school is a member of the County Athletic Association and is

represented by a girls' team and a boys' team in basket-ball and track and a team in base ball, and usually one in football.

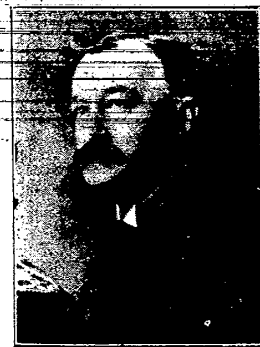
**THE CANNON STORES**

Ever since January 1889 when Patrick Cannon bought out the Frisbey General Merchandise Store in the old Ellis block, the name of Cannon has been foremost in Andover's business affairs. At that time John and James, boys then, were associated with their father and afterwards each was taken into the firm on attaining his majority. In 1896, having outgrown the Ellis store, the firm then P. Cannon & Sons, bought out P. C. Lynch & Co.'s grocery stock in order to acquire the Menzo Bundy store which, with the McTigue store, was to accommodate their increased business, together with the post office, John then being postmaster.

For years the business grew until in 1917 the opportunity came to acquire the Burrows business, Frank Burrows, the survivor of A. M. Burrows' Sons, leaving for other fields. Since then "Jim" conducts in the old up-town stand a classy shoe store and a clothing store that our townspeople are proud of.

John runs the Burrows store which is devoted to the sale of dry goods and groceries exclusively.

The two brothers are still partners, but having the two stores more room is given to carry the large stocks now necessary to keep business at home. They are both live wires, progressive and influential members of our community, conducting two stores that would be a credit to any town.

Druggist

Mr. Oliver E Vars is the dean in the drug business of Allegany County longer than any other person. After completing his college course in Alfred University, specializing in chemistry, instead of returning to his native state, Rhode Island, he came to Andover, found him a bride and opened a drug store on Greenwood Street, forty-three years ago, and has been on the job at the same stand ever since.

Mr. Vars has always been a liberal

Wholesale Merchant in Allegany County Whole Milk Cheese

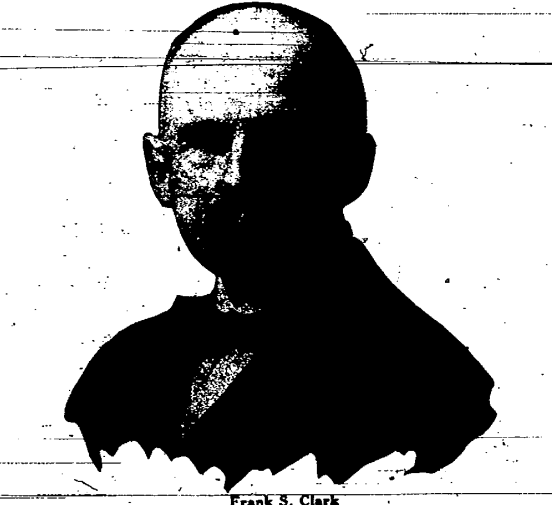

**A. C. Frisbey**

Was born in Andover, Oct. 2, 1837. He first settled as a young man in the town that is now Hartsville. He entered the mercantile business in Andover as the junior member of the firm of Cole & Frisbey in 1873. Three years later he took the business over alone, and continued it till 1889. He was for many years a member of the Andover Board of Education, eleven years its president. He was Andover's postmaster for four years under President Cleveland's administration. In 1883-4 Mr. Frisbey was elected Supervisor of the Town of Andover as a Democrat with 125 Republican majority to overcome. He helped build the Home Enterprise block and has been one of the directors in the Home Enterprise Company since its organization. He was a number of years President of Andover State Bank and is now Chairman of the Board of Directors.



**Frank S. Clark**

Was born in the Town of Independence, came to Andover in 1882 and engaged in the mercantile business. He was a member of the firm of D. M. Clark & Son, being the junior partner. In 1883 entered into the firm of Snyder & Clark wholesale cheese merchants.

Mr. Clark has been Town Clerk and Supervisor of the Town of Andover and was one of the first trustees of the Village of Andover.
