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With the coming of the cold weather, meat in the home becomes more and more part of the menu. It is not always in such abundance. The smaller cuts of meat become highly conserving, so that the unexpected guest requires an emergency meal must be prepared quickly. Pork, beef, veal or chicken, as well as tenderloin and liver, may be canned successfully by the following method which is furnished by the State College at Ithaca.

Free the meat from the bone, preferably, and cut it in pieces of such size that they will go easily into the jars. Pack the raw meat solidly into clean tested jars, filling the jars to within three-fourths of an inch of the top. Sprinkle over the top of the meat one teaspoonful of salt for each pint of meat. Add no water. Celery leaves, onion, pepper or other seasonings may be added if desired.

Continuous heating is necessary in canning meats. Most authorities now agree that it is advisable that meat should be canned under heat. By this method, the meat is heated under ten pounds of steam pressure for 1½ hours. Soup stock should be heated under the same pressure for seventy minutes.

NEW YORK HAS FEWER AND LARGER FARMS

Census Figures Show Tax Per Cent Decrease in Number and Seven Per Cent. Increase in Size

From 1910 to 1920 there was a decrease of ten per cent. in the number of New York farms, or a loss of 14,402 farms. In 1880, New York had 241,856 farms; in 1910 there were 227,454, and in 1920 only 193,129. This change, however, does not represent a large number of abandoned farms, according to farm management authorities at Cornell.

From 1880 to 1920 there was a decrease of about 20 per cent. in the number of New York farms and a 25 per cent. decrease in acreage of improved land, but a decrease of only 12.5 per cent. in acreage of land in farms.

The average size of farm has increased from 99 acres in 1880 to 107 in 1920, it is evident, says the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca, that two factors have tended to decrease the number of farms. One is an increase in size of farms, which results from joining them together with consequent abandonment of some farm houses.

There is also a gradual abandonment of improved land to pasture or woodland. This is largely an economic result of the use of improved and larger machinery which makes it no longer economical to till many small irregularly shaped or hilly fields that could be worked profitably under pioneer conditions.
