—John Bell killed an O. I. C. hog a year and a half old, Wednesday, dressing 450 pounds.  
—Mr. and Mrs. Peter Hubertus, of Wellsville, celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary Nov. 8th.  
—The Blo-Bo-Bo Orchestra, furnished the music for a dancing party at Greenwood Friday evening.  
—Andover teachers of our public schools were in Wellsville Saturday attending a teachers' conference.  
—John Beardsley, a farmer living near Bolivar, recently found a silver coin in the ground, bearing date of 1735.  
—The American Legion voted to adopt the daisy as their official flower at their national convention held recently.  
—A number from Andover attended the Armistice Day party, at the City Hall, at Wellsville, last Friday evening.  
—Alonso Slocum, of Payneville formerly of this village, has moved to the Elias Harris farm at that place which he has rented for the year.  
—Frank Halsey and family have moved from Davis Hill to their new home on Engrey Hill which he purchased recently of Atty. C. L. Earley.  
—Ray Welsted, of Wellsville, returned Sunday night from a hunting trip in the Adirondacks, bringing with him a fine buck deer which he shot.  
—Wild rice and celery has been ordered from Canada for planting in the city park at Rochester for the purpose of attracting wild water fowl.  
—Mrs. E. B. Keogh, of Wellsville, fell on the icy walk while going to church Sunday morning, fracturing her arm and spraining her shoulder severely.  
—The house on the West Park farm near Andover, owned by Mrs. W. B. Keogh, was recently visited by a party of friends who were entertained by Mrs. Keogh and her family.

—Director Deputy Robert D. Merrett, of the Andover Masonic Lodge No. 588, Monday evening Nov. 15th. The third degree will be conferred and refreshments served. All members are urged to be present.  
—Wm. R. Conderman, of Hornell, was shot and killed last week while on a hunting trip in Adirondacks. His body was found on a trail near Spruce Lake. It is supposed he was hit by a stray bullet from a hunter's rifle. Deceased was 60 years of age.  
—A Roxville correspondent says that a car driving from that place to Greenwood last week was "held up" in the road for five minutes to move on, and the animals were not at all hurried by the automobile, but took their own time in leaving the road.  
—The opening of a new meat market in Hornell last week, brought the prices of meat down in competition about one-half what it had been selling for. Sirloin steak at nineteen cents a pound and pork roasts at fourteen cut, the food bills down considerably.

—Mrs. B. G. Hayes, of Rushford, fell thru a trap door into the cellar at her home, Oct. 31st, suffering a bad fracture of the leg, the broken bone protruding thru the flesh. She is at the Olean Clinic where fears are entertained that she may be obliged to submit to amputation.  
—Betheda Hospital at Hornell graduated six nurses who had completed a two and one-half year course of study at their annual commencement exercises Wednesday evening. Among them we note the name of Miss Sarah Childs, who is a niece of Wm. Childs of Andover.

—Miss Ethel Litchfield, physical culture instructor in Andover High School, was operated on last Friday, for the removal of tonsils and adenoids, at the Mountain Clinic Hospital in Olean. Miss Litchfield is now at the home of Miss Edith Brainard where she is gaining nicely.  
—Tuesday morning the barn on the farm owned by Rev. James French in Christain Hollow, near Greenwood and occupied by Ralph Wilcox, burned to the ground. There was \$300 insurance on building, but Mr. Wilcox lost a large quantity of 60 young hens, carpenter tools to the value of over \$300, besides other articles stored in the barn.

—Mrs. Lydia Langworthy died at the home of her nephew, Dr. W. V. Coon in Alfred, Nov. 10th, from the effects of inhaling smoke from a fire which occurred at her home two days previous to her death. The greater part of her life was passed in Georgia where she was engaged in teaching in the cotton districts. The past fifteen years she had resided in Alfred.  
—Clarence Cochrane, of Wellsville, had the misfortune of getting his left hand caught in the cog wheels of a corn cutter a week ago Saturday while assisting at the farm home of his brother, Chas. Cochrane, of Belmont. Mr. Cochrane's hand was badly mutilated, the end of his thumb, first and fourth fingers being cut off and the middle finger broken. The hand is healing as well as could be expected.

—Upon several occasions guests at the Auditorium dancing parties have been greatly annoyed by the presence of those under the influence of liquor. Wednesday night at the request of Brown & Snyder, Officer R. K. Hamman was in attendance to prevent any boisterous actions which he did in such an efficient manner as to receive many compliments from the dancers, and much to the chagrin of several old offenders.

### Red Cross Gives \$310,000 to Aid 'Clean-Up' Drive

An appropriation of \$310,000 for Red Cross work in connection with the "clean-up" campaign instituted by the Government to bring the claims of all disabled service men who are entitled to Federal aid before the proper government bureau for action, has been made by the American Red Cross. The Executive Committee of the American Red Cross in making the appropriation authorized the appropriation of \$35,000 of this sum to the American Legion to defray the expense of the Legion representatives assigned to the various districts of the Veterans Bureau.  
The remainder of the appropriation was authorized for apportionment among the several Divisions of the Red Cross for carrying on that part of the "clean-up" work that falls directly upon the Red Cross organization.

### Young America Sends Vast Relief To Needy Abroad

Various relief projects of the Junior American Red Cross in European countries resulted in helping 237,000 destitute children during the last fiscal year, according to the annual report of the American Red Cross for that period. The growth of the activities of the Juniors abroad is manifested by a comparison which shows this figure is 200,000 larger than that of the previous fiscal year.  
The National Children's Fund raised by school children, members of the Junior American Red Cross, was drawn upon for \$420,557 for these projects. Receipts for the National Children's Fund during the last fiscal year totalled \$155,817.
