HOG BAD FOR MEAT

Does Not Keep - Some Butch-ering Hints

ering Hints

In curing pork, care is necessary not only in handling the hog after it is killed, but before, according to the State-College at tituca.

Rough handling of the hog before killing may cause bruises in the meat which will lead to spoifing. Undussantly when well lead to spoifing. Undussantly warms the meat. All of the animal heat must be considered, usually by hanging the carcass in a cool place.

If intchering is done in cold weather, he most of it is, the meat must not freeze before or during curing if it is to keep sweet and good. Of course the brine flust be sterilized by boiling before the meat is but in, and all containers, weights, and utensila which touch the meat must be accessed and sterile as possible.

Diseased hogs, of course, should not be used for meat. Some diseases of the bone—for example, rickets,—usually cause the ham to spoil, and other parts are affected by other diseases.

TESTING WOOL MATERIAL SHOODY

Methods of Telling Whether is "Pure Quill" Explained by Textile Workers

Those who purchase winter clothing or material made from wool-or supposedly made from wool — are in-terested to know whether they are - are inonlying genuine wool or shoddy and otton. It is comparatively difficult o detect the presence of some shoddy to detect the presence of some shoddy, or adulterant except by earefully controlled laboratory tests, but a few simple tests for wool which will aid the purchased are given by the workers in textiles at the State College of Agriculture.

The Burning Test
Another test for wool is that of burning a sample of the material.
Wool burns much like hair; it moulders slowly and soon is exting sished. An all-woolen material leaves to the material lea

Material may also be torn, or solled apart, as a test of the fiber and thus strength of the material. Wool material tears with a dull or muffled sound. The case with which the cloth tears depends on the middle of the sound.
