The farm home of Merton A. Chase, on Hill Hill, three miles from Wellville, was practically destroyed by fire Thanksgiving Day. The fire started in the kitchen and spread to the main part of the house. The loss was estimated at \$100,000. The building was actually burned by the fire.

CLAYTON'S BUREAU TO MAKE COURT SURVEY AND CANVASS  
Plans made for membership campaign to start December 5th intended to interest all farmers.  
Efforts will be made to increase the membership of the Allegany County Farm Bureau Association by the committee getting in personal touch with the farmers in their districts during the campaign which will be staged from December 5th to 21st. Plans for the canvass were presented at a meeting of the executive committee November 16th by C. P. Moulton of Cuba, chairman of the Membership Committee.  
The members of the executive committee are of the opinion that Allegany County farmers who are not members of the organization will be interested when the work done by the bureau and the opportunities it offers for service are explained by the committee of their own neighborhoods. It was stated at the meeting that there are a great many members of the numerous co-operatives who are not Farm Bureau members altho the Farm Bureau has done much to aid them.  
A committee has been asked to make a complete canvass of every farmer in each town. The canvassers will at the same time make a survey of the interests of each farmer, recording the number and breed of all kinds of livestock, whether purchased or grade, and the number for sale or wanted; the acreage in cash crops and the owners of tractors and milking machines.  
It is figured that this record will be of inestimable value to the work in the county, to farmers themselves and to the county as a whole.

### BOLD ATTEMPT AT FORGERY THWARTED

A hold attempt to forge a check on the Silver Springs National Bank against R. Chapman, a well to do farmer living near Silver Springs, was thwarted by the presence of mind of the cashier, L. M. Clarke, Saturday morning.  
A telephone call, purporting to be from Mr. Chapman, stated that, as he had run out of check blanks, he had written a check on a plain piece of paper and that a young man would be in with the check within a short time. When the stranger presented the check the cashier, instead of cashing it at once, turned to the telephone to call up Mr. Chapman. The stranger thereupon decided that he had some other errands he might be performing while the call was being made and he forgot to return.  
A large brick block including the new State Bank of Rushford, the dry goods and grocery store of Laphan & Sawyer, Benjamin's furniture store and undertaking equipment, and Thomas' jewelry store, was entirely destroyed by fire early Thanksgiving morning. The office of the Rushford Spectator was slightly damaged by one of the walls in falling and the Baptist Church across the street was scorched by the heat.  
The fire was discovered in the basement of Thomas' jewelry store, at 4 o'clock Thursday morning. In spite of all that could be done by the local fire company the flames were soon beyond control, and within a couple of hours all that remained were heaps of smoldering ruins from the fallen walls. Some furniture was saved from the first floor of the furniture store, but the rest had to be reached by the fire, but very little could be saved from the other buildings. The printing office next door survived only because of its brick walls and metal roof, and was damaged slightly by one of the falling walls. The paint on the Baptist Church on the opposite side of the street was badly scorched. The damage is estimated at \$25,000, and is partly covered by insurance. It is thought that Benjamin & Sawyer may rebuild.  
The cause of the fire is unknown, as there was no fire in the furnace of the basement in which it started, and the switch in the electric light circuit was pulled.

### LARGE BUSINESS BLOCK IN RUSHFORD DESTROYED BY FIRE

George W. Mead, a former resident of Andover, died Thursday, November 24th, at the home of his son in Bradford, from a cancer on the neck. Deceased was 78 years of age, a veteran of the Civil War. He leaves a family of several children, one daughter, Mrs. Jesse Slocum, residing in this village.  
The remains were brought to Andover Friday and buried Saturday in Hillside Cemetery beside his wife, whose death occurred some years ago.
