Fruits and Vegetables

Potato haulings limited. Country prices nearly steady except sacked. Sacked haulings down 10c f. o. b. shipping points at 75c to 85c per 100 lbs. wagon loads cash to growers. City market quiet. Movement slow. New York market. Round Whites up 10c in Philadelphia at \$1.90 to \$2; stronger in Baltimore at \$2 to \$2.15; down 10c in Pittsburgh at \$1.95 to \$2. Maine Green Mountains steady in Boston at \$1.85 to \$1.95. Carlot sales sacked Northern Round Whites up 10c in Chicago at \$1 to \$1.75. Red River Chios up 80c in Chicago at \$1.60 to \$1.70; down 20c in Kansas City and St. Louis with heavy supplies at \$1.50 to \$1.65. Eastern apple markets generally stronger. New York A2 1/2 Baldwins up \$1 in New York City at \$7.50 to \$8; firm in Baltimore at \$6.50 to \$6.75 per bbl. Maine No. 1 Baldwins stronger in Boston at \$5 to \$6. Northwestern Extra Fancy Jonathans stronger in Chicago at \$2.25 to \$3 per box; steady in Kansas City at \$2.75 to \$3. Onion markets steady movement slow. Yellow varieties steady at \$5.25 f. o. b. per 100 lbs. sacked f. o. b. Massachusetts shipping points. Philadelphia market up \$1 at \$6 to \$6.25; Pittsburgh stronger at \$5.50; Baltimore weak at \$5.50 to \$5.65. Middlewestern yellows unchanged in leading markets. Danish cabbage up \$2 bulk per ton f. o. b. New York points at \$40, with slow movement. City markets advance. New York Danish stronger in New York City at \$48 to \$50. Philadelphia now \$45 to \$48 compared with \$38 to \$45 last week. Chicago up \$5 at \$48 to \$50. Northern Danish made similar advance in Chicago and stronger in St. Louis at \$50 to \$55.

Livestock and Poultry

Chicago hog prices declined 15c to 30c during the week, medium and heavy hogs declining most. Top quotations on the various grades of hogs were generally from 15 to 25c lower, while the lower end of the range advanced a similar amount. Cows were generally 20c higher with feeder steers unchanged. Fat hogs up 75c higher and feeding lambs generally 50c higher. Yearlings and fat ewes advanced 25 to 75c. December 5 Chicago prices: Hogs top \$7.10; bulk of sales \$6.60 to \$8; medium and good beef steers \$6 to \$10; butcher cows and heifers \$3.60 to \$3.75; feeder steers \$4.60 to \$5.60; light and medium weight veal calves \$6.25 to \$9.25; fat lambs \$9.50 to \$11; feeding lambs \$8 to \$9.15; yearlings \$6.25 to \$9.25; fat ewes \$9.25 to \$5.60. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending Nov. 25 were: Cattle and calves 68,265; hogs 5,668; sheep 88,325. The general trend of wholesale fresh meat prices at Eastern markets was upward. Veal advanced \$2 to \$3; lamb and mutton \$1 to \$2 per 100 lbs. Beef was irregular, being quoted 50c lower at some markets and 50c high-

er at others. Fresh pork loins up 10c. Dec. 5 prices good grade \$15; light grade loins \$18 to \$19; mutton \$10 to \$12; best \$12 to \$14; veal \$12 to \$14; heavy loins \$12 to \$14.

Eastern hay market developed strength during the week. Timothy up \$1 per ton at Boston and Philadelphia and \$3 at New York. Colder weather improving demand in West but receipts fairly large and equal to demand. Southern markets continue dull and inactive. Quoted December 5: No. 1. Timothy Boston \$28, New York \$33.50, Philadelphia \$23, Pittsburgh \$21.50, Chicago \$23, Minneapolis \$19, St. Louis \$23, Atlanta \$27. No. 1. alfalfa New York \$28.50, St. Louis \$25, Kansas City \$20.50, Omaha \$16.50, Memphis \$24.50. No. 1. prairie Kansas City \$11.50, Omaha \$12, Minneapolis \$16, Chicago \$18.

Grain

Wheat unsettled and averaged lower for the week, Chicago May wheat losing 2 1/2¢ net and closing at \$1.15 1/4. Chicago May corn down 1/2¢ closing at 54¢. Market narrow at the close with weakness in July wheat affecting December and May. Visible supply wheat 47,763,000 bushels, a decrease of 978,000 bushels for week. Visible supply corn 15,518,000 bushels, a decrease of 1,796,000 bushels for week. Closing prices in Chicago cash market: No. 2. red winter wheat \$1.22; No. 2. hard winter wheat \$1.12; No. 2. mixed corn 50¢; No. 2. yellow corn 50¢; No. 3. white oats 33¢. Average price to farmers in Central Iowa for No. 2. mixed corn about 34¢; to farmers in Central North Dakota for No. 1. dark Northern wheat \$1.08; to farmers in Central Kansas for No. 2. hard winter wheat 95¢. For the week Minneapolis May wheat down 1/4¢ closing at \$1.21; Kansas City May wheat down 3¢ at \$1.01 1/2; Winnipeg May wheat down 3/4¢ at \$1.11 1/2.

Dairy Products

All butter markets except Chicago steady to firm. Chicago declined sharply Saturday and again today, under heavy supplies of practically all grades. This followed consistent gain for more than a week during which Chicago prices were higher than at New York. Storage butter moving better in all markets. The week's imports included around 116,000 pounds from Denmark. Closing prices 92 score: New York 46 1/2¢; Boston 46¢; Chicago 44¢; Philadelphia 47¢. Cheese markets steady.
