Dean Titaworth announced in assembly the Allegany County Tuberculosis Commission's annual campaign for the sale of Red Cross Christmas seals to aid in its work of stamping out tuberculosis and thus eliminating one of the greatest scourges of mankind. 85 per cent of the money raised by the sale of these seals is kept in the county. By means of this work the death rate produced by tuberculosis has been decreased from 130 to 98 per 1000. At present there are 95 patients and 95 suspects in the county. The University and community have recently had the insidious work of this scourge brought sharply to their attention, and should contribute liberally toward the seals, which may be secured at the various stores or from Mrs. Middaugh at the Brick. Mrs. Sherman Burdick has charge of the campaign in this town.

The annual Y. W. C. A. Christmas Fair will be held at the Brick, in the association's rooms, during the week beginning Monday, December 12th. There will be Japanese articles, fancy work, dolls, and candy for sale. A special feature will be the "grab bag" from which the purchaser draws at random. Specialty teas will be held Monday and Wednesday afternoons. This fair is the work of the missionary committee and the receipts are used for the general fund of the association. Everyone is asked to come and co-operate in making it successful.
