### 69 PER CENT. OF JUNIOR WORKERS STUCK IT OUT

Out of 13,589 "Starters" 9,377 Proved Themselves "Finishers," Says State Junior Extension Leader.

Fishing was good last summer, the swimming hole was tempting, and the vacation fever raged on every side, but 69 per cent. of the rural boys and girls who undertook junior projects carried them thru and turned in the regular report forms. Many more did the actual work of their project, but failed to keep the records called for when they started, thus barring themselves from being classed as "finishers."

The state leader of this work makes this report, adding that 1922 completions were about 6 per cent. greater than those for last year. His report also shows that there are now 20 counties employing one or more paid junior extension leaders, whereas three years ago there were but 13.

Madison County was first in completions, with 91.2 per cent. of the youngsters coming thru; Rensselaer was a close second with 90.3 per cent. finishing; while Chemung and Chenango practically tied for third place with 80.9 and 80.8 per cent. respectively.

Attention is called to the fact that Chenango County has the largest enrollment for the work of any in the state, and Chemung the third largest.

### TIMOTHY MAY NOT

#### GOOD DAIRY FEED

Its Use Brings up Cost of Milk Production — Good Legumes a Substitute for Concentrates.

If you want to increase the cost of producing milk, feed timothy hay to your dairy.

This is the way the animal husbandry men at the State College of Agriculture are pointing out to the farmers of the state the superiority of legume hay over the non-legumes, such as timothy, for feeding.

They tell of an experiment which showed this clearly. Two lots of cows received identical rations aside from the hay fed. The groups were alternately fed either ten pounds of alfalfa hay or ten pounds of timothy hay. The result indicated that the alfalfa ration produced seventeen per cent. more milk.

For dairy cows, clover and alfalfa have practically the same value. Alfalfa sharpens the appetite and gives greater gains in weight, but excessive feeding without sufficient variety may over-stimulate the kidneys.

Legume hays are good substitutes for concentrates in the ration. With all factors equal as to cows, feeds, nutritive ratio, and the like, milk production has been fully sustained in some tests by substituting eight pounds of alfalfa hay for eight pounds of wheat bran. Good soybean hay can be used in the same way. With wheat bran or other concentrates at 45 a ton and alfalfa and clover at \$20, what this means in cheapening rations the college thinks is apparent.

### FARMING BETTER EVERY DAY, IN EVERY WAY

"The general feeling is that the agricultural situation has turned a corner, and that like Dr. Coue's celebrated formula, it is growing 'every day, in every way, better and better,'" says a review issued by the Department of Agriculture. Murmurs of increased cotton, corn, and meat production the coming year are already being heard by department representatives — an unfailing sign of optimism. In the East farmers are somewhat cheered up by slightly higher prices for potatoes, cabbage, onions, and other truck crops. It is estimated that cotton

farmers will get about \$500,000,000 in cash more than they had last year. Conditions in the corn belt are reported as improved. Corn husking is practically over; winter grain is in fairly good shape.

The citrus fruit harvest on the Pacific coast is reported as good, especially of Valencia oranges. The navel orange crop is somewhat smaller than last year, but better as to quality and size of the fruit.

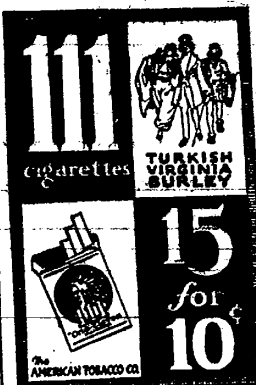
