Washington, Jm. 15. — The cost of living in the United States decreased 11 per cent in the year just ended. There were reductions in the prices of food, clothing, furniture and furnishings and miscellaneous items, but slight increases in rentals and fuel and light. As compared with two years ago, when the cost of living attained its peak, the drop amounted to an average of 23.2 per cent. Even now, however, prices average 66.3 per cent. higher than in 1913.
