—The Knights of Columbus of the State of New York, have presented to the veteran's mountain camp of the American Legion \$1,000 in cash, on account of \$10,000 which they have pledged for the camp. The camp is situated at Tupper Lake, New York for the use of tubercular and other veterans of the World War.

—The V. A. The kitchen, pantry and bathroom were damaged to the extent of about \$1500 before the flames were gotten under control.

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—The body of Miss Frances Matthews, former editor of the Havana, N. Y. Journal was found frozen to death in a snow drift, a short distance from her home at Interlaken Jan. 18th. Miss Matthews had been missing from her home since Monday.

—Contractor Clarence F. Allen, of Richburg, has taken the contract to drill 77 wells for the Forest Oil Co. on the Ackerman, Reed and Smyth farms in Bolivar and Wirt townships. Work has begun on two wells and the contractor expects to have them all completed by December next.

—Pheasants are reported dying from starvation in many places as a result of the ice which covers the ground under the snow, making it impossible for them to obtain any food from the soil. Rod and gun clubs are purchasing grain and arranging for the birds to be fed.

—Northern parts of the United States are feeling deep anxiety on account of the invasion of packs of hunger-mad wolves from Canada. Scores of packs of these grey timber wolves are now working havoc among farm animals. Mail carriers have been attacked by them.

—In a letter renewing his subscription to the News, T. R. Bassett of Albany, formerly of this village writes, that they are all fine, which their many Andover friends will be pleased to learn. Mr. Bassett also states "that they have more snow than any time since he has been in Albany. Not much coal in the city, we have had plenty so far and expect lots very soon and that they will pay us to take it, as soon as 'Al' gets things going. There has been very few changes in our department in the past two years. The department has grown so much that it is impossible to lay any one off. In the department where Mrs. B. works they made nearly five thousand more examinations this year than last."

"Vapor Cure" for Whooping Cough. In Devonshire, England, the peasantry treat the patient on a sheep's "formie." A formie is the imprint that a sheep makes on the grass by lying in one place all night. When the animal gets up in the morning, a sort of vapor rises from the warm ground underneath into the cold air of the early dawn.

—The sufferer is taken out into the meadow where the sheep are at daybreak, laid face downward on the formie, and has then to breathe this vapor in, not merely through the nostrils, but with open mouth. He must breathe it until the ground is cold and there is no more vapor to be sucked from his lungs. This takes about five minutes. Then the patient goes back to bed, and in a few hours his cough has left him—or at least so say the Devon folk.
