BOND SALE

The trustees of the Village of Andover, in the County of Allegany, and State of New York, having been authorized by a special election duly held in said village on the 25th day of April, 1922, to expend the sum of Thirteen Thousand, Four Hundred and Sixty Dollars to pay the cost of fixing and improving portions of the Greenwood Street and Broadway Avenue in the Village of Andover, New York, and issue bonds to raise said sum of money, and to pay the cost of said bonds upon its faith and credit to be paid within two years from the date of such issue in installments with interest payable annually, and the said trustees have also been authorized to raise annually by tax upon the taxable property of said village sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds as the same became due.

And in pursuance of Village Law Section 166 Chapter 657 Laws of State of New York, 1922, and of a resolution duly adopted on the 7th day of February, 1923 by the Board of Trustees of said village,

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, New York, at the office of the clerk of the said village, in the Village of Andover, New York, until 8 o'clock p. m. of the 19th day of February 1923 for the purchase of twenty bonds aggregating a sum of Ten Thousand, Six Hundred Dollars, said bonds are to be in dimensions of Five Hundred Thirty Dollars each consecutively numbered from 1 to 20 inclusive, bearing date Feb. 20, 1923, with interest payable July 1, 1923 and annually thereafter on the 1st day of each July, one of said bonds to mature on the 1st day of July, 1923, and one of said bonds to mature on the 1st day of July of each year thereafter until the whole series is paid with interest.

Bidders must state the amount of their bids, which must be not less than par, and deposit with their bids cash, certified check or bank draft for 5 per cent. of the amount of such bonds, and pay the balance with accrued interest when said bonds are delivered.

The Board of Trustees of said village hereby reserve the right to reject any and all bids.

Bids must be sealed and sent to the Clerk of the Village of Andover, N. Y., and endorsed on the outside of the envelope, inclosing them: "Proposals for Street Improvement Bonds."
