THE FLU HAS GOT US

LEFTOVER CORNMEAL MUSH IS DELICIOUS IF FRIED

Leftover cornmeal mush is delicious when fried. It may be poured into a pan wet with cold water. When it is cold it is then sliced, rolled in dry meal, browned in a small amount of fat, and served with sirup. Another way of using it is to cut it in cubes, fry them in deep fat, and serve with sirup or tomato sauce. If the mush is to be fried it should be made stiff by using a smaller proportion of water.
