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## IOWA SENATE VOTES TO CONFISCATE VEHICLES TRANSPORTING LIQUOR

The Iowa Senate has just voted to make any vehicle found transporting liquor subject to seizure and confiscation.

The measure, which was sponsored by the State W. C. T. U., provides that any carrier — motor car, airplane, wagon or boat — caught in use by anyone for the transporting of liquor, shall be sold by the county, and the proceeds derived therefrom appropriated to the school funds.

Under the terms of the bill the presence of liquor, whether it be in a jug under the seat, or a flask in a door pocket, will be taken as evidence of intent to transport the liquor.

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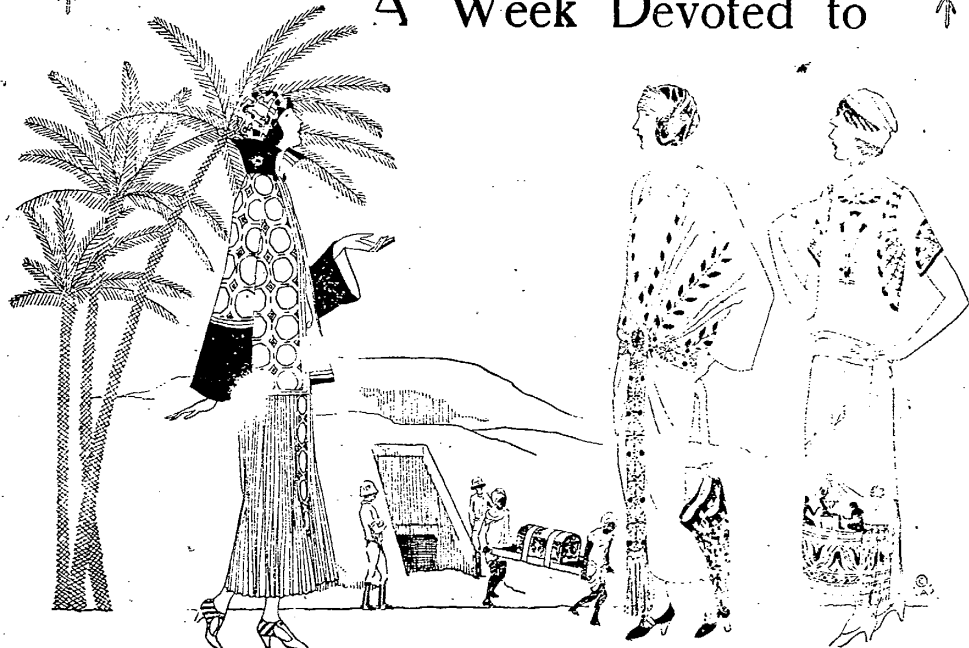
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
