Victory Bonds bearing the distinguishing letters, G, H, I, J, K, or L, prefixed to their serial numbers, are now redeemable by this bank at par and accrued interest. After May 20th, 1923, these bonds earn no interest.

Called Victory Bonds, A, B, C, D, E, and F, on which interest ceased last December 15th, should be cashed immediately. Holders of these called bonds are losing interest at the rate of about \$10,000 a day.

You can avoid loss in interest upon your own Victory Bonds by converting them into an Interest-bearing Account here.

—We have more faith in the effect on breaking the sugar trust of the boycott by the women, who have banded together for that purpose, than in the promised investigation by President Harding.

—Fillmore people are having their troubles in trying to erect a new school building that will be satisfactory to the Department of Education of the State and all classes of their own citizens.

—Mrs. Hazel Saunders, who has been employed as Allegany County and Surrogate Court stenographer for the past seven years, has resigned. Miss Marion Osgood, of Belmont, will take her place.

—The mean temperature in Andover for the month of April was 41.98 degrees. That of April 1922 was 40.73. It will be seen therefore that April 1923 was one and a quarter degrees warmer than it was in 1922.

—The store fixtures belonging to the O'Neil Grocery and what remained of the stock of goods and household goods of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Barnett, who had charge of the O'Neil Store, were moved to Hornell, Tuesday.

—Mrs. Margaret Hallett, of Shinghouse Pa., and sister, Mrs. Hurst are moving into the Tracy property on Pleasant Ave. recently purchased by Mrs. Hallett. Mrs. Hurst has been occupying apartments in the P. J. Dougherty residence on Chestnut street.

—The Compensation Court, held in Hornell, Friday, awarded Mrs. Cora Burdell, of Hornell, and child, \$50 a month during the remainder of her life. The accident in which her husband met death in an automobile occurred near Alfred, last fall. He was an Erie Railroad official.

—A break in the United States pipe line at Sharon Center, recently, let about 200 barrels of refined (kerosene) oil escape from the line before it could be repaired. Farmers and residents for miles around rushed to the scene and salvaged oil enough to last them for months.

—The Village of Belfast was without city water supply last week when fire destroyed the power house of the water plant and put out of commission the engine and compressor used to pump the water from the deep wells into the reservoir. The loss was estimated at \$6,000.00.

—"Clean up day" in Andover is one of the best things ever adopted in this village in the way of civic improvement. We remember with pride that this village was among the first in the county to adopt the plan at a request to the village board from the Lucy Stone Club, which was an active organization here at that time.

E. O. Reynolds, of Alfred, is one of the prominent officers of the company.
