—Dr. Stanton H. Davis, eldest son

—James A. Parsons, of Hornell,  
personal legal advisor to Governor  
Smith, was taken suddenly ill in  
New York City Wednesday, accord-  
ing to an Associated Press message.  
The message said that his condition  
was regarded as serious, but the  
nature of the malady was not an-  
nounced.

—Hanford Smith, of Rushford,  
nearly lost his life last week while at

ist Church, was learned with regret  
by many Andover people. Mr. Har-  
rington lived in Binghamton, where  
for some years he had been at the  
head of one of the departments in a  
large store. He was 33 years of age,  
a deacon in the Main Street Baptist  
Church of the city and for the past  
four years had served as superintend-  
ent of the Sunday School. He leaves  
a wife and son. His death resulted  
from heart failure following an op-  
eration for appendicitis.

**DR. J. P. CLEARY'S LECTURE**

Splendid Description of Hawaiian  
Islands Given Friday Evening, at  
Baptist Church

The lecture by Dr. J. P. Cleary,  
Friday evening, at the Baptist Church  
drew a full house and was a decided  
success in every way. The doctor's  
address was most interesting and  
pleasing from start to finish. He  
gave details of the life and customs  
of the native Hawaiians and described  
the many wonderful scenes and fea-  
tures of the Islands as only can be  
done by one who has visited the place  
in person.

A number of colored slides of  
Hawaiian scenes had been made from  
photographs obtained by the doctor  
while stationed on the Island with  
the U. S. Medical Corps, which  
helped materially in the vivid de-  
scription.

So interested had the audience  
been in the story told by Dr. Cleary  
that when his lecture had ended the  
people were loath to go home. But  
when they consulted the time it was  
found that the doctor had been talk-  
ing at a rapid fire, machine gun rate  
for nearly one hour.

Dr. Cleary thinks he has got that  
job off his hands now, but knowing  
the temperament of Andover people,  
we know he has just begun. They  
surely will demand another address  
from our genial physician in the very  
near future.

write a series of articles descriptive  
of his experiences in foreign lands  
for the News, the first of which, tell-  
ing of Paris, France, will be found  
in another column of this issue of the  
News.

**TURBINE CORPORATION  
WILL LOCATE AT SCIO**

Wellsville, May 14. — A contract  
was closed to-day by which the  
Standard Turbine Corporation, now  
operating in this city, becomes the  
owners of the two acres of land on  
River Street, directly east and ad-  
joining the Erie railroad at Scio. The  
purchase includes the residence of W.  
Q. Downing.

It is reported that the citizens of  
Scio have raised \$40,000 to secure  
the industry, have paid in 10 per  
cent. of the subscriptions and by  
this sale of location are assured of  
the erection of the plant in that vil-  
lage at an early date. Wellsville,  
which was a bidder, loses out to its  
neighboring town.
