# Farm and Stock Mart

(Washington, D. C. For week ending May 14, 1923.)

**Fruits and Vegetables**

Florida potatoes higher eastern markets for the week lower in Pittsburg and markets farther west. Texas stock lower. Old potatoes steady to firm. Cabbage declining. Texas onions about steady. Strawberries generally weaker. Prices reported May 14-South Carolina Wakefield cabbage \$2.75-3.75 per bbl. crate in eastern markets, Virginia pointed stock \$3-3.25 in Boston. Alabama flat type \$2.65-3.50 in mid-western cities, Mississippi pointed cabbage \$3.50-4.25. Total shipments week ending May 12 were 929 cars. Texas yellow Bermuda onions \$2.50-3 per standard crate in city markets, \$2 fob shipping points. Week's shipments 533 cars from all sections. Florida Spaulding Rose potatoes \$7.50-8.50 per bbl. consuming centers, \$6.50 fob. Texas sacked Bliss Triumphs \$6.50-7 per 100 lbs. in the Middlewest. New York sacked round whites \$1.65-1.85 per 100 lbs. Maine Green Mountains \$2.25-2.35 in Boston. Northern round whites \$1.05-1.15 in Chicago, \$1.35-1.65 in most other cities, 80c-1 at shipping points. Week's shipments 2,134 cars old potatoes, 873 new stock. North-Carolina Klondike strawberries 15c-27 quart basis in eastern cities.

**Live Stock and Meats**

Chicago hog prices ranged from 10-25c lower for the week. Beef

cattle advanced 10-20c and butcher cows and heifers 10-25c; feeder steers were 10c lower to 15c higher and veal calves 50c net higher. Fat lambs \$1-1.15 and yearlings steady to 75c up while fat ewes declined 75c. On May 14 hogs were steady to strong, spots 5c higher than Saturday's average. Beef steers 10-15c lower and fat lambs 25-40c higher. May 14 Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$7.95; bulk of sales \$7.40-7.90; medium and good beef steers \$8.35-10; butcher cows and heifers \$5-5.85; feeder steers \$6.50-8.40; light and medium weight veal calves \$8.25-10.50; fat ewes \$4.25-7.50. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending May 4 were. Cattle and calves 53,054; hogs 13,466; sheep 6,306. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets beef and veal steady to 1c higher; lamb \$2-4; mutton 50c-2 and light pork lions 50c-1 up and heavy lions weak to 1c lower for the week. On May 14 beef was 25-50c, veal and lamb \$1-2 higher at Boston; beef 50c-1 higher, pork lions firm to \$1 and lamb \$1-3 up at New York; Beef 50c, veal and mutton \$1-2; lamb \$2 and pork lions steady to \$1 up at Phil. May 14 prices good grade meats: Beef \$14-16; veal \$13-14.50; lamb \$24-29; mutton \$17-19; light pork lions \$19-22; heavy lions \$13-17.

**Hay**

Receipts continue very light as

**Feed**

Demand dull. Extreme weakness prevailed in wheat feeds in Kansas City Market. Shorts difficult to place in that market and track stuff is offered at sacrifice prices. Fairly good demand for bran for July August shipment at \$20 per ton. Season bran quoted about \$19 per ton. Quoted May 12 bran \$27, middlings \$28, flour middlings \$29, Minneapolis; gluten feed \$37.15 Chicago; 32% linseed meal \$40 Minneapolis, \$39 50 Buffalo; white hominy feed \$33 St. Louis, \$34 Chicago; 36% cottonseed meal \$38 Memphis, \$39 Atlanta.

**Grain**

Wheat prices closed fractionally lower for the week, but corn was 1 1/2c higher. Weakness in stocks and cotton, lack of support, and selling by eastern interests were main depressing influences. Wheat started strong on the 14th, but ran into

Continued arrivals of Canadian and Danish butter and the reports of negotiation and butter from other countries have caused some uneasiness. Closing prices, 92 score butter: New York 43 1/2c; Phila. 44c; Boston 44 1/2c; Chicago 41 1/2c. Cheese markets fairly steady with held cheese more active and firmer than fresh goods. Wisconsin primary markets were barely steady at the close.
