LAFAYETTE HIGH SCHOOL WINS INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

Lafayette High School of Buffalo won the Alfred Interscholastic Track Meet yesterday by a score of 21 points.

Hutchinson High and Technical High, both of Buffalo, gained 17 and 14½ points respectively. In spite of the rain that fell in the morning and again at noon, a good showing was made in all the events.

The record for the 440 was broken by one-fifth of a second by F. Gunyberger of Coudersport, who covered the distance in 54 flat.

The high point winner of the meet A. Buckner, of Tech. High, who won first place in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, and made a fine showing in the relay race. In the latter event he started with a handicap of 50 yards and finished only a few feet behind his opponent.

The new cross-country course that was to be tried for the first time could not be used because of the heavy rains in the morning. A course entirely over roads, about 2½ miles long, was used. Maston Park won the race from Bradford by one point.

One prominent characteristic of the meet, the largest interscholastic meet ever held in Western New York, was the failure of any one school to star.

The result was in doubt right up to the last minute and then the winner was ahead by only 4 points. The smaller schools were at a disadvantage when competing against the larger ones. Still many first places were captured by athletes of smaller schools. The large schools won because of the balance of their team over that of their smaller opponents.
