THE governments of Europe are facing troublous times again.

Each is nursing grievances against the others, and those grievances are rapidly approaching to the point of eruption.

At the same time they are harried to the point of desperation by troubles at home.

Bolshevism is the great Europeon spectre, and it is not at all impossible that the next few years will see the red banner waving in practically every country "over there.'

That is the opinion of many wise students of international affairs, who are seldom wrong in their deduc-

"Over here" it is somewhat better, considerably different, yet with a degree of similarity that is distressing to contemplate.

We have a large class of people who are honorable, thrifty, and have an abiding faith in the future stability of our government. But that faith is sublime, and is prone to overlook or ignore the danger signals that are springing up from day to day.

Stealing from the people in the form of profiteering, graft in public office, shirking of just taxation by the rich, indifference to the manner in which state and national affairs are conducted, these are some of the danger signals to which too little heed is given, yet they constitute a condition that is producing a dangerous spirit of unrest and hatred and class animosity.

Over here red agents do not attempt to secure converts from among those who are prosperous and contented, and seldom among those in the middle walks of life. Their proselyting is done among those who have a real or fancied grievance—among those who are not so well favored with the goods of this world.

Europe made the mistake of temporizing the red snake and of doing nothing to remove the cause of his creation. That snake is now a full grown serpent and is menacing the security of the governments of the old

Over here we are treading the same path, drifting into the same fatal error. We are doing little or nothing to eliminate profiteering, to abolish graft, or to require rich corporations and individuals to bear their just proportion of the burdens of taxation.

These conditions, if not corrected, will eventually throw us into the same chaos that exists on the other side of the water.

It is for such conditions that bolshevism watches and waits.

So much for "over here."
