—Three children in the family of Robert Clark, of Cuba, developed Mastoiditis in one week, recently.

—Merle Rogers, of Olean, 35 years of age, lost his life at an oil well Monday, where he was overcome by the gas.

—Mrs. John Knight, of Arcade, wife of Senator Knight, is the newly elected president of the Western New York Federation of Women's Clubs.

—Alfred is planning a community Fourth of July celebration which includes a picnic dinner on the campus, a ball game and sports on the athletic field.

—The Protestant churches of New York State are arranging to erect a chapel, costing \$100,000 at Sonysa, for the benefit of the patients at Craig Colony.

—Mrs. Eliza Gallagher and daughter, Miss Anna, left Monday morning for two week's visit at the home of Mrs. Gallagher's sister, Mrs. E. A. Cassidy, at New York City.

—Belmont and Bolivar are tied for first place in the Allegany County Base Ball League so far this season. Wellsville and Cuba are also dividing the honors of the cellar position.

—A large crowd attended the dancing party, at the Auditorium, Wednesday night. Music was furnished by Fitch Bros. Orchestra of Olean. Supper was served by the Rebekahs.

—Elwin A. Ladd, superintendent of the public schools at Batavia, was found drowned Tuesday in a cistern at his home. Worry over trouble at the high school and ill health is given as cause for the act.

—The women of Glens Falls have recently waged a successful campaign against billboard and similar advertising in street and highway. Massachusetts has a law prohibiting display advertising within the bounds of the public highway or an any fence or tree bordering such a road.

—An automobile Club has been organized at Angelica.

—Lyle Hunt has been suffering an attack of erysipelas the past week.

—Mrs. John Nobles gave a variety shower, Thursday evening, for Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Mead.

—Ira A. Easton, of Cuba, has been appointed deputy sheriff of the county to succeed the late Earl Harris.

—A heavy down-pour of rain Thursday, was welcome in this locality. Our fields and gardens were needing it badly.

—4,124 graves of Civil War Veterans in the cemetery at the Bath Soldiers Home were decorated with flags and flowers on Memorial Day.

—There are 450,000 farms in this country that produce tobacco. American factories manufactured sixty thousand million cigarettes last year.

—A barn on the William Gallmar farm, in the Town of Allen, was struck by lightning Tuesday evening, and with two other barns was burned to the ground.

—James T. Costigan, of Friendship, has been appointed District Deputy Grand Master of Allegany County by Grand Master Arthur S. Tompkins, of New York.

—Several auto loads of Andover people motored to Rochester Sunday, the day being the annual Lilac Sunday, held in that city each spring. They report a fine display of flowers.

—Wellsville has adopted the new plan of parking cars at an angle, instead of a long side of the curb in hopes to partially relieve the congested condition on Main Street in that village.

—Plans are under way to expand St. Bonaventure College to a university. A drive to raise a million dollars has been started to enable the institution to build the necessary buildings and purchase equipment. It is expected to increase the student accommodations to 2,000 students.
