Mrs. Charles H. Huntley died June 11th, at her home in Scio, of heart disease.

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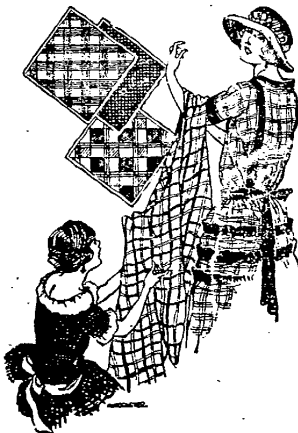
