—The May oil report in the Bolivar Breeze gives twenty-nine wells completed in the Allegheny field with new production of 99 barrels.

—The S. D. Baptist Ladies Aid Society held a business meeting followed by a social hour and supper, Tuesday afternoon, at the home of Mrs. Jennie Flint.

—The New York State School of Ceramics of Alfred is now the largest one of the kind in the United States. The exhibit of the work of students during Commencement is especially fine.

—A unique event was celebrated May 30 at the Golden Wedding of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Perry of Vossburg, Bolivar township, and the wedding of their grand-daughter, Miss Arlowene M. Perry to Bert Baldwin, of Bolivar.

—Triplets were born to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bohoy, of Corning, June 11th. The infants weighed three and one-half pounds each and are expected to live. This makes twelve children in the family of which the oldest is eleven years.

—Cashier A. D. Fuller, of the State Bank, had his tonsils removed Saturday. Dr. Cleary was the surgeon.

—Lightning killed three Jersey cows belonging to Julius Updyke during the storm of last week Thursday evening.

ALLEGANY PARK OPENED

Development of Summer Resort Being Pushed by State and Nation.

Prof. Henry R. Francis, head of the Department of Forest Recreation of the New York State College of Forestry, Syracuse, N. Y. has occupied headquarters in the Allegheny State Park, Cattaraugus County, where he will officially open the park for the summer season.

Professor Francis, during his vacation, will help direct many improvements in the park this summer which will include extension of trails and camping facilities and the commencement of the preliminary work of constructing the ridge road along the crests of the mountains that follow the Allegheny River south to the Pennsylvania State line. This road when completed will afford rare scenic advantages to the tourist which Professor Francis claims will compare favorably with mountain scenic roadways of California and other similar automobile highways. It is expected that the development of forest parks in Pennsylvania by the state and federal government will result in the extension of the ridge road into the extensive mountain regions south of the Allegheny Park.
