## THE VILLAGE ORDINANCE

Can't Burn Powder Legally, Only on National Holidays

The Board of Village Trustees has been asked to pass a village ordinance against the use of fire arms and the discharge of powder in the village. As such an ordinance has been in existence for years, we republish it herewith for whom it may concern.

Discharging of Fire Arms, Etc.

Any person who shall discharge any species of firearms, rocket, squib, gun-powder, or any fireworks, or thing whatsoever charged with gun-powder or other explosive matter, in any of the roads, avenues, lanes, streets, or public places of this village, or in the vicinity of any building therein shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. This does not apply to National Holidays.
