—George W. Hathaway, 46 years old of Alma, was struck by lightning June 26th, and instantly killed. Mr. Hathaway was moving from one house to another and had just entered the house to carry out some furniture when the bolt came.

—Miss Helen Folsing entertained a company of friends at cards Thursday evening of last week. The occasion was a very pleasant one. It was the birthday anniversary of Miss Folsing, and also of one of the guests, Mr. Leo Snyder, both of whom were remembered with gifts.

—George B. Elwell, of Wellsville, has been appointed by Governor Smith as a delegate to represent the state at the annual conference on taxation to be held at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va. next Fall. The conference is composed of fourteen men from as many states, and Prof. Bullock of Harvard is its president.

—Word was received Thursday of the death, Wednesday, of V. A. Baggs of Alfred at the home of his son, Arthur Baggs, at Marblehead, Mass. The funeral services will be held in Alfred, Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. Mr. Baggs is well known throughout the county, having for years conducted a mercantile business in Alfred.

—Andover sent a good delegation over to Alfred Wednesday to enjoy the celebration. In the morning a pleasing parade was the main feature. The community dinner was held on the campus followed by a patriotic address by Dr. Davis. A squad of overseas veterans in uniform raised the American flag on the staff and after a fine speech by Winfield Randolph led in the salute to the colors. The races, jumps and athletic feats held on the athletic field was followed by the ball game. Good music was furnished throughout the day by the Alfred Band.

Food Prices Rise in Cities; Farmers' Products Decline.

While the price of food was rising in most of the large cities between April 15 and May 15, as reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Labor, the prices of most of the principal agricultural products were steadily declining. The farmer was reaping no benefit from the upward range of prices for what in large part he had produced.

In the middle of last month (June) hogs sold for less money than they had brought to the producer since 1912, when the Taft (Republican) administration was in power. Wheat and other crops have been dropping in price for two years—ever since the "special agricultural tariff" was enacted by the Republican Congress in 1921.

Last year's potatoes sold at the farm for an average of 60 cents a bushel, according to the Department of Agriculture, but the consumer in the cities had to pay never less than twice that much for them.

NOTICE TO CUT WEEDS

This is to notify you that section 54 of the Highway Law requires that the owner or occupant of lands abutting upon the highway shall, before the first day of September in each year, cut and remove all noxious weeds, briars and brush growing within the bounds of the highway fronting such premises. If the owner or occupant fails to perform this duty, sections 54 and 55 of the Highway Law requires the town superintendent to cut and remove the same during the month of September and assess the cost as a tax against the property. The town superintendent of your town will be held strictly accountable to the department for the enforcement of the law in this respect.
